PASTOR'S QUILL

I subscribe to a newsletter from a storyteller friend of mine. Her work centers on grief workshops, with a special focus on widows. On the Tuesday after Easter, I got an email from her with the headline "Does your life need a resurrection?"

We could all use a little resurrection in our life. And keep in mind that Easter is not a day – it is a season! Through the end of May, we are actually still in the Season of Easter – so it's appropriate to think about resurrection.

First, a definition:

Resurrect (transitive verb)

1. To raise from the dead.

2. To bring to view, attention, or use again.

In the church, we usually just use the first definition when we talk about resurrection, especially on Easter Day. But in the Season of Easter, perhaps we should focus on the second definition. Perhaps we should focus our attention on re-viewing our life. What new attitudes or habits can we bring to this season of resurrection and new life?

In thinking about this, a quote from Rosemary Budd comes to mind. "*The music of humility is the sound of laughter*." Humility and laughter? How do they go together?

Well, perhaps you've had a moment when you look at yourself in the mirror and you see yourself as you really are — they good stuff, the good intentions, the positive feelings you put out into the world. And then you also see your shortcomings, the mistakes you've fallen into and the dumb decisions you made. And you couldn't help but laugh at yourself a little bit.

That's the music of humility! Humility is simply knowing the truth – the truth that our skills and abilities, our success and stability, our health, and even our faith, are all gifts from God the Creator. We own nothing. We don't own success; we receive it as a gracious gift from God.

As Rosemary Budd writes, "If I own nothing, then no one can take it from me. From humility springs poverty; from poverty springs freedom; from freedom springs joy."

Perhaps that attitude can lead us to the kind of resurrection we need in the Easter Season. Re-view your life through the lens of humility and laughter, and eventually joy will spring forth.



Music Ministry

Thinking about intentional outreach has been a simmering priority for me since I interviewed for my position as Director of Music Ministry here at FPC. While the past two years certainly presented an unplanned portage, of sorts, I remain committed to increasing and promoting well-rounded community outreach and involving our music program in it. I believe this congregation (especially in light of its surrounding community) absolutely must be engaged in outreach and we are a particularly adept creative crowd with the power to make meaningful offerings.

It's been at least 10 years, according to Carol Evans (or maybe more), since FPC hosted a Summer Worship Arts and Music camp. I learned of this recently, only to find that my 'new' idea was really just an old tradition in need of refreshing.

So, plans are coming together for a new take on this scheme-following Vacation Bible School during the same week, we will be offering a **Summer Music/Arts/Drama Camp** this June. **Monday, June 13 through Friday, June 17 from 12:30-4:00PM**, for children and youth age 5 and up.

Aside from somewhat similar arts engaged offerings from SEMYO and Ironwood Springs Christian Ranch, I have found very little that compares to this in our area.

My goal is to provide families the opportunity to have their children engaged for a 'full' day if they take us up on VBS and our M/A/D Camp. This is for any young person in the broad community who has artistic gifts that they'd like to exercise and enjoy, and grow.

Engagement is needed from the FPC community to provide support in many ways: teaching, helping lead creative sessions, and learning alongside our attendees is very much needed, as well as folks willing to help facilitate lunch to bridge the gap between the end of VBS and the beginning of M/A/D Camp. We already have members planning to offer opportunities for students to engage in choral singing, keyboard and other instrumental opportunities, a workshop for Ghanaian Drumming and Dancing, creative writing, and more. What gifts can you bring, and what gifts are you willing to recognize and help foster in the young minds who will join us?

For me, lifelong learning was one of the most important concepts instilled in me through my education. I hope that I'll never feel that I've learned everything I need to know or lack the desire to take my knowledge and experience of something a step further. A church music ministry program is a wonderful space to foster that concept at the individual level and in community through tradition, worship, liturgy, and more.

I hope you'll consider joining this effort and getting in touch with me to talk about how we can promote this outreach opportunity as a positive offering for area youth and as a mutually beneficial ministry. All good gifts are from God, and I think we (as artists) share a common vocation to share our creative gifts and passions not only as an expression of ourselves but to return the favor of the gift with the hope of contributing to what is beautiful in and about our society.

2022 marks a *century of giving* to the Birthday Offering of Presbyterian Women. It was launched in 1922 to honor the 100th anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States. Over the last 100 years, grants funded by Presbyterian Women have impacted the ministries of more than 200 organizations and transformed the lives of countless people, especially women and children. It is a message of hope. Circles will collect this offering at their May meetings. The recipients this year are:

Celebrating a Century of Giving and Receiving

- 1. Mission at the Eastward (MATE), McCleary House Transitional Housing, Farmington, Maine. This grant will help renovate McCleary House for people experiencing homelessness. Poverty has been increasing in Maine, with a growing number of vulnerable people losing their job due to job loss, eviction, sickness or economic hardship, all complicated in the last years by the pandemic. This transitional home will provide a warm, healthy place for families or individuals. It also will provide a safe space for individuals to begin the psych-social, educational and vocational work needed to move forward with their lives.
- 2. Iglesia Presbiteriana de Lares (Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand), Puerto Rico. Following the hurricane of 2017 and the earthquake of 2020, the Presbyterian Church in Lares has become the go-to location in the community for food, purified water. and personal items. With much of the population elderly and infirm, they rely on the church for help with necessities. Because the kitchen is small, dated, and not up to code, upgrades are needed to continue this ministry. Solar panels and a heavy-duty generator will also be installed to provide uninterrupted electrical service and water availability.



Let's Talk About Hearing, Speech & Stuttering

Our knowledge and understanding and our ability to communicate them do not always go hand-in-hand, as even the apostle Paul knew (see 2 Corinthians 11:6). This disparity can be frustrating and life-changing.

Stuttering is caused by interruptions in speech from repetition of a consonant or prolongation or absence of sound. While up to 5% of children struggle with stuttering, around 1% of adults do as well. Stuttering can be inherited and is related to brain and mouth coordination rather than intellect or emotion. Speech therapy and support can help but it can worsen during times of stress. When speaking with someone who is stuttering, don't make remarks like "slow down," "take a breath" or "relax" - while well meant, such remarks are patronizing. Try not to finish sentences or fill in words. Be particularly patient on the phone, where communication is hardest. Speak in an unhurried but not unnaturally slow way. Maintain eye contact. Show you are listening to what they say, not how they say it.



Bruce Willis's recent diagnosis with aphasia has brought this diagnosis into public awareness. Aphasia is a language disorder that may occur after a stroke or brain damage and can affect speaking, understanding, reading and writing. People with aphasia may struggle to find their word, use an incorrect word, switch sounds in words, use made-up words, struggle with sentences or scramble real and made-up words. Doctors can help discern the cause and speech-language pathologists can help treat the symptoms. If a loved one has aphasia, make sure to get their attention and keep eve contact. Talk in a quiet place and remember that they may not have trouble hearing but rather understanding and do not need increased volume. Remember this does not reflect intelligence but language processing. Use short sentences and simple but adult words and slow down your speech. Have patience in waiting for replies, and use drawing, pointing, writing and yes/no questions when helpful. Allow mistakes, and let them take their time.

During May, we commemorate Better Hearing and Speech Month and National Stuttering Week to help raise awareness about communication disorders and promote treatments that can improve the quality of life for those who experience problems with speaking, understanding or hearing.
