Murasaki Duo closes 2015-2016 A Festival of Music season

Time: Sunday, April 10 at 4 p.m. Place: First Presbyterian Church Sanctuary

The Murasaki Duo, which consists of 'cellist Eric Kutz and pianist Miko Kominami, was founded in 1996. The Duo has performed throughout the United States, Canada and Scandinavia and has won recognition as one of the leading ensembles in its genre.

Advocates for new music, the Duo actively commissions new works in addition to performing the classics. Their second compact disk, "Duo Virtuoso," was released in May 2015 on the Delos label and features several show pieces as well as Brahms E minor Sonata. Their next recording project, "The Commissions." will include five works commissioned and premiered by the Duo, all written during 2007-2012.

Their Festival of Music program will feature showpieces from "Duo Virtuoso" and the Sonata in F by Richard Strauss.


Both Kutz and Kominami, graduates of Juilliard School of Music, are active as teachers, chamber musicians, orchestral musicians, and soloists. Eric Kutz, who served as a faculty member at Luther College for the last thirteen years, was appointed Assistant Professor of Cello at the University of Maryland School of Music in 2015. Miko Kominami enjoys a varied career on the faculty of Luther College and as Principal Keyboardist of Orchestra Iowa.

April 2016

I was sitting at the light at the intersection of Elton Hills Drive and North Broadway last week when a disturbing sight passed by. A pick-up truck drove through the intersection with a 3-foot by 5-foot Confederate flag flying from the cab. I'm sure it's

not the only one in town, but it was a sad reminder for me that the uglier side of human nature is still very much with us. It is a disheartening fact that evil rises by telling us who to hate. Hate those who protest. Hate those who have a different opinion. Hate those who are of a different race or a different sexual orientation. Hate those who are Muslims, or immigrants or refugees. Evil rises by pointing fingers, laying blame and telling us who to hate. But Jesus taught us a different way. Life is not about hate – life is about love. Good triumphs by not listening to words of hate but by loving those the world teaches us to despise.

I remember the first time my youngest son met my brother-in-law Todd. Todd is a black man with long dreadlocks who teaches African-American literature at St. Thomas in the Cities. We were still living in Brookville, Pennsylvania at the time and Juliet's side of the family were all getting together for Christmas. Thomson was about 3 years old, and he had never met a black person before, so Juliet and I were a little nervous about what he would say when he met Todd. When we arrived, you could smell the turkey in the oven and the Christmas cookies were laid out on the table. The whole family came to greet us, and there was Todd. Thomson looked up, pointed at him and said, "You're black." And without missing a beat, Todd pointed back and said, "I know, and you're white." Thomson thought about that for a second, seemed satisfied with that explanation and said, "Let's get some cookies!"

You're black – You're white – Let's have some cookies. If only life was that easy. If only we could acknowledge our differences, accept each other without the need for hate and blame, and just have some cookies. The good news is that Jesus showed us how to live like that. Love others – even your enemies. Love those the world teaches us to hate. That's the Jesus way.


