CRISIS: Your Future Independence

"And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus."

(Philippians 4:19)

Having just celebrated our Independence Day on July 4, we tend to think in terms of not being a slave to others, or of not relying on others. It can also apply to the young person who leaves home for college and his or her 'independence' for the first time. Or when we pay off the mortgage and are independent of the bank. There is yet another form of independence – one that applies to those in their 30's, 40's — 90's. It is the thought of living independent.

The present world is full of unknowns. How long will I live? How long will my loved ones live? Will I develop some incapacitating condition at some point? Who will take care of me? Will I have funds to pay for my or my spouse's expenses? Will there be any government programs available, considering the possible elimination or decrease of funding given today's political environment? These are the concerns of those 65 and older, but, "also," the increasing concerns of the young people of today: and rightly so! Because it is that population that can do something about their prospects.

In 15 years, the population of Olmsted County is expected to have increased by approximately 18,500. Given the ratio of growth over the years of 2010 to 2015, the proportion of those 65+ is increasing dramatically faster than any other segment of the population (12.6 % of the population in 2010; 14.4% in 2015). Of the population increase from 2010 to 2015, **51.1%** were over 65. From 2015 to 2035, that population will increase **59%**. Remember, if you are 47 today, you will be 65 in 2035!

There is more than sufficient reason to be concerned if you live in Olmsted County. As indicated above, a dramatic increase (over and above that of the state of Minnesota) in the 65+ population is about to occur. And in an alarming manner. More people, from all over the country and world, are moving to the Med City because of Mayo Clinic's high ratings in health care. The 65+ population is dramatically outpacing the working population, i.e., meaning more individuals are needing assistance of various forms with a decreasing number of individuals to provide the necessary attention. Government funding is decreasing as states and the country tighten budgets. Younger members of society have demonstrated less ability to save adequately for retirement.

On Tuesday, August 29, the Social Concerns Committee will present their 10th Forum @ First, a special panel on CRISIS: Your Future Independence. The panel will include Dr. Susan Brower, the State of Minnesota Demographer, making a rare appearance, given her very busy schedule. In addition to Susan, the Forum will include Ms. Emily Ties, Director of Adult and Family Services, and Mr. Scott Maloney. Executive Director of Rochester Family Service.

This invitation is to encourage you to attend and participate in a very relevant conversation. Remember to save the date.



If only we could turn deadly ammunition into instruments that could be used to bring about peace. We've all heard the expression "the pen is mightier than the sword." Perhaps the pen is mightier than the bullet as well.

I hope I get that cartridge pen for Christmas this year!

The power of weakness

In Tramp for the Lord, Corrie ten Boom describes traveling to Russia during the Cold War — when Christians were being persecuted — to thank an old woman who'd been secretly translating Christian books (including ten Boom's). Ravaged by multiple sclerosis, the woman could move only an index finger. Yet with it she typed constantly, translating words while praying for people who'd eventually read them.

Ten Boom's reaction was, "Oh Lord, why don't you heal her?" But the woman's husband said God had a purpose in his wife's suffering. Although the secret police closely watched other Christians, they left this woman alone, assuming she couldn't accomplish anything.

Jesus works through our weaknesses, making his power perfect in them (see 2 Corinthians 12:9). He doesn't ask if we're capable — only if we're willing.

Mission coworkers David Cortes-Fuentes and Josey Saez Acevedo visit FPC

Our congregation has a history of supporting Presbyterian Mission Coworkers. Several years ago we hosted Shelvis Smith-Mather, who at that time was serving in South Sudan. Shelvis and his wife, Nancy, are now in Uganda supporting refugees fleeing South Sudan. Most recently Drs. Cindy and Les Morgan, who have served in Bangladesh for years, were here. Also, FPC has had a strong partnership with the Presbyterian Reformed Church of Cuba in Jagüey Grande since 2008.

On Tuesday, August 1 we will have the privilege of welcoming the Rev David Cortes-Fuentes and his wife, Josey Saez Acevedo, mission co-workers serving 15,000 members of the Presbyterian Reformed Church in Cuba. David and Josey, originally from Puerto Rico, are the newest mission co-workers our church is supporting.

The following background comes from the Mission Crossroads and Presbyterians Today publications. "The Presbyterian denomination first had a presence in Cuba in 1890. The Presbytery of Cuba was formed in 1904 and was placed under the Synod of New Jersey. Cuban Presbyterians formed the Presbyterian-Reformed Church of Cuba in 1967. Because of the revolution led by Fidel Castro in 1959 all but one missionary left Cuba in the early 1960's. David and Josey are the first mission co-workers sent to live and work in Cuba since then."

David is on the faculty of the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Matanzas, an ecumenical institution which has been in existence for more than 70 years. He teaches New Testament and Greek, preaches in several churches (Presbyterian and Baptist) and teaches in a program for Cuban Pentecostal pastors. Josey is a Christian Educator who works in educational efforts in churches.

David said "In recent years, the Cuban government has eased restrictions on religious expression. In fact, it has come to recognize the important role churches play in meeting community needs. The government encourages churches to become centers that serve children, youth, and the elderly." David and Josey are also involved in helping to heal what is known as the "Cuban-to-Cuban" issue, which has to do with Cubans who left the island and those who did not leave. David has said that this has created both a challenge and an opportunity for the church.

We plan to use our time with them to get acquainted. We will meet in the lounge at 7:00 p.m. in a conversation-type format so that we can learn not only what they do but also what they need from our congregation. We will have the opportunity to share our interests and our resources. Is there a project that our congregation could focus on? What about travel to Cuba and some details about groups traveling there? What about an intergenerational trip option?

This is a great opportunity for us to get information and insights about a country that has certainly been in our news over the past year or two. Please plan to attend.

No pressure, but know your pressure

Blood pressure is the force our blood exerts against the veins and arteries that transport it through our

body. Just like real pipes, when our vessels get stiff and crusted, steady high pressure can lead to problems.
Often with both plumbing and high blood pressure, there is no sign of trouble

and we may not know there is a problem until it

is too late unless we check. With plumbing these end result incidents (a ruptured pipe, a leak) are often expensive; with blood vessels, they are expensive and lead to devastating life changes like heart problems, strokes, and kidney failure.

How can you find out your blood pressure? Get it checked! Parish Nursing checks blood pressures the first Sunday of the month whenever possible. We have just added a second cuff size to make patients more comfortable. In addition, your primary care clinic can help arrange a blood pressure check with a nurse or a visit with a doctor. Knowing your blood pressure allows your provider to appropriately control your blood pressure, bringing it down to a lower risk zone. What does your number mean? That depends on age and other health factors, but a healthy blood pressure is considered <120/80. I hope to see you soon at our monthly blood pressure drop-in!



Lebanon supports education opportunities for Syrian refugees

The National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (Presbyterian) runs five special refugee schools in Lebanon, serving close to 400 children. These schools, in Tyre, Minyara, Kaba Elias, Rayak, and Tripoli, address the needs of refugees in Lebanon who have come across the border from Syria.

Scholarships have also been provided for Syrian students whose educational backgrounds prepared them well enough to enter one of the synod's five "regular" schools in Lebanon. 1.2 million Syrian refugees are registered in Lebanon; 60% of them are children.

The synod would like to expand the scope of this project to include Presbyterian children and young people who are still in Syria and need educational assistance.

Many causes have come across our desks and our hearts this year. We thank you for your generous responses to all of them.

February: CWS Blankets

In February our congregation gave \$6,590 and joined over 4000 churches across the nation in Church World Service's **Blankets** program. Besides blankets, Church World Service provides emergency supplies such as tents, mosquito nets, food, bottled water and health kits to places in the world where disaster has struck.

March: Minnesota Foodshare/Channel One

Each March we partner with other caring people in the Rochester area to help alleviate hunger. Through **Minnesota Foodshare** we joined with food shelves across Minnesota to collect donations of money and food that support local efforts to help feed people in need and reduce hunger in our community. This year First Presbyterian members contributed \$6,820 in cash plus additional donations to the food barrel.

March/April: One Great Hour of Sharing

The Mission Committee extends thanks to the congregation for their wonderful response to the **One Great Hour of Sharing** offering collected in April. FPC collected \$7,850 for this special offering that helps support Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People.

June/July: Bdecan mission project

The **Bdecan Backpack project** is a special program. This year we made fleece blankets and scarves and collected sleepers, onesies, little socks, rattles, baby shampoo and other baby supplies. so the social worker on the Spirit Lake Indian Reservation can provide clothing and personal items for babies when they are placed in foster homes at birth. You responded generously and in addition we received \$900 that was used to purchase diapers.

June: Pentecost Offering

Each year on **Pentecost** Sunday, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit as a bringer of new life. Gifts to the Pentecost Offering help bring God's transforming, redeeming love to children at risk, guide and nurture young people's growing faith, and provide opportunities for young adults to become spiritual leaders – all in the name of Jesus Christ. This year FPC members contributed \$4,474.

In all these special causes, your dollars really do make a difference and we thank you for your generosity.


The log in your eye
