

December 2018

I got a letter from Pakistan a couple of weeks ago. I don't often get word from Pakistan, so I thought I would share it with you. This letter is from an Islamic student named Iqra Shakoor. Iqra is a young woman who attends Forman Christian College in

Pakistan. Our mission committee has been supporting Forman for a number of years by contributing to their scholarship fund and Iqra is someone who has benefitted from that financial aid. One of the reasons I really like Forman is that Christians and Muslims are brought together to study and learn—not only about academics but also about their cultures and religions. Here is what she had to say...

I belong to Dera Ghazi Khan, which is my home town. It is quite a remote area where education is not a priority, specifically for females. Education is particularly important for me because I grew up in an environment where education of women was not a compulsion. This was always very disturbing for me and motivated me to pursue higher education so I can help eliminate this tradition from the society I belong to.

Forman Christian College (A Chartered University) provides an American system of education where students can not only learn and gain knowledge but can also take part in many personal development and social activities which grooms students both academically and socially. The environment here is very diverse with students belonging to all regions, castes and religions. This helps promote a harmonious and tolerant environment.

My father is the only earning head of our family and he works as a Govt. employee. I have five siblings and all of them are studying. It was very difficult for my father to afford all of our educational expenses, hence, I applied for financial aid to remove some of the responsibility from my father's head. I am grateful to Forman for providing me with financial aid so I can continue my studies here.

I would like to say that Forman has helped me in grooming myself by offering me different avenues for self-development. I am currently pursuing a Masters degree in Chemistry. My hope further goal is to pursue a PhD from abroad and eliminate this narrow minded stereotype that women's education is not necessary.

This is just one of the ways that the monies you give are used to bring justice and peace all over the world. Thank you for all you do in support of First Presbyterian Church!

Christmas tree in the atrium will be decorated with colored gift tags, each representing a charitable organization in Rochester. This year we are adding a new one, Brighter Tomorrows, to our list.

- Brighter Tomorrows (assists families who have encountered a childhood cancer diagnosis)
- Medcity Foundation (Kristina Hesby's organization that provides general assistance to blood cancer patients and their families. This includes lodging, food and other financial needs.)
- Alternative Learning Center Daycare (gifts for infant children whose high school parents are finishing high school credits at the ALC)
- 4) Family Promise (also known as Interfaith Hospitality Network. Family Promise provides assistance for homeless families in the way of housing, meals, daycare, and employment.)

Our church youth group will be wrapping and delivering these gifts. Deadline for returning the gifts is December 9.

Select a gift tag off the tree and purchase the item or items on the tag. As far as wrapping the gift, follow the instructions on the tag. It is important that you attach the tag to the gift when you return it to the church office so we know to which organization the gift should be delivered.

Instead of purchasing a gift there is also the option of purchasing a gift card from one of our local stores. Put the card in an envelope and drop it off in the church office.

Lee J. Afdahl, our Director of Music and Organist since 1991, has announced his retirement effective May 31, 2019.

A search committee for his replacement will be formed soon and all the necessary steps will be taken to insure that the Ministry of Music will be in good hands for years to come. The Personnel and Administration Committee will keep the congregation notified of progress in the search. We solicit your prayers and patience in the process.

Lee says, "Thank you for the many blessings and talents shared over the past 28 years. I will continue to lead in the music ministry faithfully through the end of May."

Handbells in worship celebrate 50 years!

We have celebrated the gift of music as provided by voices and instruments throughout our church's history, but the unique sounds and ministry through bells began at First Presbyterian in 1968. This ministry is not just about music-making as you realize. It's a team effort and bonding that comes through diligent work in many rehearsals on a weekly basis and attending handbell events together.

Through memorial monies and special gifts to the program through the years, our initial set of three octaves of Schulmerich handbells made in Pennsylvania have been expanded to this inventory: five octaves of Schulmerich handbells plus the new large G2, G#2, and A#2, five octaves of Malmark handchimes, new Schulmerich Greig Ashurst design mallets, singing bell sticks, Peery tables and we are on our second set of red table covers, a vastly expanded handbell/handchime music library, gloves, music folders, etc.... all the necessary equipment of the art form.

Presently we loan our equipment to the Rochester Area Handbells, our community's first community handbell ensemble led by **Paul Kingsbury**. We have participated in many handbell festivals in the region and locally have performed in Yulefest concerts with the Rochester Symphony in the early 1990's. A small ensemble has been a wonderful outreach program to the community during holidays past. The children's handbell program has been expanded to include attending Young Ringers' Camp in odd numbered years. We look forward to many more years of music making to the glory of God through the handbell/handchime program of our music ministry.

Christmas Joy Offering to be received December 23

Every generous act of giving...is from above. (James 1:17) The Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930's. The offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The goal is to assist church workers in their time of need and students in their time of promise.

The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families due either to declining health or a catastrophic event, such as Hurricane Maria in Puerto Rico.

Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. This has been a Presbyterian commitment for nearly 140 years. Many of the students are the first in their families to enroll in higher education. The schools receiving funds are Menaul School in Albuquerque, New Mexico; Presbyterian Pan American School in Kingsville, Texas; and Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Students receiving scholarships and support at these schools means they have a brighter future and enhanced opportunities to use their talents and skills.

Your offering will be received on December 23 although you can contribute through January by putting your donation in a Sunday offering or mailing it to the church.

Healthy eating at the holidays

The holidays are full of delicious but unhealthy foods: casseroles loaded with butter and sugar, pies and cookies, rich holiday meal after holiday meal. What's a health conscious reveler to do?!

1) Everything in moderation - it wouldn't be a party without that pie, but limiting yourself to one piece is doable. Also limit the Christmas cookies... those things are addictive!

- 2) Try something new it is always fun to try new, healthier spins on old favorites! For example, subbing riced cauliflower in a casserole can really lighten things up.
- 3) Salad first! When serving a large meal, offer or eat salad first so you and your guests fill up on vegetables and can enjoy a "taste" of everything else.

For more than 150 years, First Presbyterian Church has been committed to helping all people experience God's love through Jesus Christ.

Presbyterian Women support local, national, and international projects


This year's rummage sale receipts and pledges provided \$9,534 for local, national, and international projects. Many thanks to organizers **Judy Kruesel**, **Sally Brooks**, and **Jan Hosier** and the men and women who helped make the sales successful and the women who contributed pledges to PW in 2018.



- ► \$400 for **Channel One** for backpacks of food for low income students. The students take these home for the weekend.
- ► \$400 for **LINK** (Living Independently with Knowledge) which serves homeless teens.
- ► \$400 for **Hawthorne Helps Mini-Store** where students from 35 different countries, many living below the poverty level, may shop for necessities twice a month. These students are learning English and other life skills so they can improve their lives. The most requested item is toilet paper!
- ► \$400 for Community Food Response for plastic containers.
- ► \$400 for Civic League Day Nursery to provide financial aid for those who can't afford daycare.
- \$400 for Mission 21, which provides resources and restoration services to victims of human trafficking under the age of 18. They would like to hire a part-time mental health consultant as they grow their program.
- ► \$200 for the **Pastoral Assistance Fund** that is used to buy gift cards that the pastors can use to help people in need.



- ► \$400 for water filters. The filters provide families with safe water in communities struggling with lead and other contaminants in their water supplies.
- ► \$1000 to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for hurricane relief.
- \$500 to Su Casa de Esperanza, a Presbyterian border ministry whose mission is to improve the quality of life of children through a faith-based family education program.
- ▶ \$400 for urban farms. More than 23 million Americans live in food deserts, where fresh, affordable food is nearly impossible to find. Urban farms supply nutritious produce where it's most needed, while providing employment and educational opportunities that nurture communities. Some of our members who attended the Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women in Louisville, KY in August saw one of these gardens.



- \$300 to HOP (Haiti Orphanage Partners) for a month's supply of food.
- ► \$450 to Haiti Education

Foundation to provide for the education of six students. PW also provides for the education of two students in Niger through the Remember Niger Coalition.

- ▶ \$500 to NOROC, which facilitates the spiritual, social, physical, and emotional development of Romanian children who have been abandoned, abused, or orphaned. One of our former associate pastors, Richard Schempp. and his wife are currently mission workers for NOROC.
- ▶ \$400 for Small Change 4 Big Change in Guatemala. The object of this project is to give people the education and tools to be able to be self-sustaining and move up to better paying positions. They need financial aid right now for water filters for each family and educational needs. Tuition, school supplies, and uniforms needed in order to attend the high school/vocational program in Guatemala.
- ► \$684 through Presbyterian Mission Agency to provide six families of chickens and three pairs of goats to improve the food security and livelihoods of farmers and families.
- ▶ \$700 for latrines. In many countries, rural areas lack access to basic sanitation. For women, in particular, latrines promote dignity and safety, minimizing the risk of assault. They also improve hygiene and health for whole communities, reducing the risk of disease.
- ▶ \$400 for the Menstrual Hygiene Management project in Dogondoutchi, Niger, begun by PCUSA co-worker Jim McGill, to keep girls in school. Niger has the highest fertility rate in the world which creates a high population growth that is a recipe for poverty. This can be reduced by educating girls and keeping them in school.


Songs for the Waiting: Devotions Inspired by the Hymns of Advent
