

As I write this I am preparing to put out the new Advent Devotional Guide from Presbyterians Today. It's called "Straw for the Manger." I had never heard this before, but evidently there is an Advent tradition in some places of preparing the manger for

Jesus' birth by slowly adding straw during the Advent season. The tradition may have originated in Eastern Europe, possibly in Poland.

The Editor of Presbyterians Today, Donna Frischknecht Jackson tells a wonderful story about how she introduced this practice in one of her first church's, one in a rural setting. She writes in the forward of the Devotional: "I loved this idea so much that I introduced "straw in the manger" to the children in the first church I served. A young father with carpentry skills made me a manger, and since I was in a farming community, all I had to do was make a request from the pulpit for straw. However, I mistakenly asked for "hay." The matriarch of one of the farm families shook her head in dismay at the former Manhattanite who was now a country pastor and shouted, in the middle of my request, that I wanted straw, not hay. Hay was the feed for animals, she explained later. Straw was the bedding."

During the Sundays of Advent this year, we will be preparing our own manger by adding straw each week. I invite you, as you arrive for worship, to take a piece of straw and place it in the manger to symbolize your preparation for Jesus' coming arrival. By Christmas Eve, we will have the manger ready for the Christmas Pageant at the 4:00 service! So make sure to pick up your copy of "Straw in the Manger" (if you haven't already) and begin your season of preparation.

The Mission Committee will have catalogs available in the atrium on November 24 and December 1, 2019.



- Childhood Cancer Community assists families who have encountered a childhood cancer diagnosis.
- Medcity Foundation (Kristina Wright-Peterson's organization) provides general assistance to blood cancer patients and their families. This includes lodging, food and other financial needs.
- Alternative Learning Center (ALC) Daycare
 provides gifts for infant children whose high school
 parents are finishing high school credits at the ALC.
- Family Promise (also known as Interfaith Hospitality Network) provides assistance for homeless families in the way of housing, meals, daycare, and employment.

Select a gift tag off the tree and purchase the item or items on the tag. As far as wrapping and delivering the gifts follow the instructions on the tag. It is important that you attach the tag to the gift when you return it to the church office so we know to which organization the gift should be delivered. The tag will indicate the deadline for returning the gifts to the church.

Christmas Joy Offering to be received December 22

One of the most powerful things that Christians claim is that God saw the great needs of the world and offered a perfect gift – a gift that brought God and humanity closer together. God's perfect gift to us, Jesus Christ, offered the power of being with us. According to Matthew's Gospel, one of the names given to Jesus is Emmanuel, "God with us." In Jesus, God shared our human experience and chose to be with those who were often overlooked, left out, vulnerable, or in need.

We offer our gifts during this Advent season through the Christmas Joy Offering. Because God is with us, we see the potential of students of color who will become leaders and we seek to come alongside them, to encourage them, to be with them.

- ★ 50% of your gifts make it possible for students to learn and grow in faith at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. This offering supports Menaul School in Albuquerque, New Mexico; Presbyterian Pan-American School in Kingsville, Texas; and Stillman College, Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Many of the students at these schools are the first in their families to enroll in higher education.
- ★ 50% of your offering assists current and retired church workers and their families with critical financial needs through the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions.



Your Church Library: Featured Books for December

Advent presents the opportunity to seek. To set aside time for spiritual guidance. reflection and contemplation. Sometimes it helps to have a book on hand. A good book can deliver meaningful space and material for reflection and contemplation in preparation for the appearance of Jesus. The FPC library contains some worthy companions. There's a variety of genres – poetry, non-fiction, novel, children's, etc. There's something special awaiting your attention. We've gathered these books together and placed them on the mobile book cart in the atrium. Among the gems:

Songs for the Waiting - Devotions Inspired by the Hymns of Advent by Magrey R. Devega

Our hymnal *Glory to God* has twenty-five Advent hymns. While some are familiar, others may not be. Using Advent hymns and the powerful words of Scripture as a guide, *Songs for the Waiting* takes readers into the spirit of anticipation and preparation central to Advent.

Blue Christmas - Devotions of Light in a Season of Darkness by Todd Outcalt

Covering the 28 days of Advent and Christmas Day, each devotion includes a scripture selection, meditation, prayer, and suggested Advent action. "Not all Christmases are white; some are blue," author Todd Outcalt writes. While celebrations and gatherings abound, those who are hurting feel conflicted and even alienated. In these honest devotions, readers are led to name their reality, sit with difficult experiences, and acknowledge losses, in light of Jesus' promise "blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted."

Mary of Nazareth, a work of fiction by Marek Halter is based on extensive historical and biblical scholarship (according to the leaf notes).

The Roads from Bethlehem — Christmas Literature from Writers Ancient and Modern

spans a diversity of voices, time, genre and place offering multiple dimensions of Jesus' birth.

Something a bit more mainstream is *A Family Christmas* an anthology compiled by Caroline Kennedy. She gathers poetry, prose, scripture, lyrics and other forms written by authors ranging from Truman Capote, to Groucho Mark, to Martin Luther King, Jr., to E.B. White to Charles Dickens.

Roger A. Bullard's *Messiah: The Gospel according to Handel's Oratorio* is a wonderful exploration of Handel's glorious work.

The First Christmas by Marcus Borg & John Dominic Crossan is an excellent study of the Scriptures, well-written and easy-to-read.

In The Dark Streets Shineth—A 1941 Christmas Eve Story by David McCullough includes a DVD of the author narrating with songs by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

The Boxtops for Education program is changing!

For several years we have saved Boxtops for Education for Kemmerer Village, a childcare agency of the Presbyterian Church in Assumption, Illinois. The money earned goes to their educational program.

Now, instead of clipping, you can scan your receipt. The Boxtops for Education team has worked hard to build a user-friendly Boxtops mobile app (available now on the App Store and Google Play) that allows you to scan your store receipt, find participating products, and instantly add Boxtops to Kemmerer Village earnings online.

If you have clipped the traditional Boxtops, please put them in the container in the foyer. Kemmerer can still earn cash for all clipped Boxtops until they expire. 
