Backpack project supports children heading into foster care

First, imagine a child needing to go into foster care. Second, imagine that child going with only the clothes he or she is wearing. Nothing else!

Such a situation exists for many children on the Spirit Lake Indian Reservation in North Dakota. The social worker often must take children from their home unexpectedly for their protection and place them in foster care. Sometimes she must drop a child off at a new foster home without any personal belongings, knowing that they must start their time in foster care without clean underwear, socks, T-shirt or pants and without anything with which to brush their teeth or wash their face. There are presently 196 children from the Reservation in the foster care system.

They need our help. Are we up to it? The Bdecan Mission Team is hoping to collect 30 to 40 children's backpacks and underwear, socks, T-shirts, pants or shorts, wash cloths, soap, combs and small containers of shampoo for the social worker to put into the backpacks for these children. Don't worry about getting the "right-sized" clothing; we need a variety of sizes for children, both boys and girls, from toddlers to age ten. We already have lots of tooth brushes and tooth paste donated by three dentists.

From June 1 to June 26, containers will be in the atrium for the items for the children. If you would like to help, but don't have time to shop, please make a check to First Presbyterian Church and put "Backpack Program" in the memo line.

We will take the donated items when we go to the Bdecan Presbyterian Church in July to lead Vacation Bible School. Joe Obermeyer is youth pastor at the church. 

June 2016

In a recent Sunday morning Current Issues class, we looked at an article written by David Brooks, a columnist for the St. Paul Pioneer Press. In a piece called "How covenants make us," Brooks notes the difference between a "contract" and a "covenant." He writes, "When we go out and do a deal, we make a

contract. When we are situated within something it is because we have made a covenant. A contract protects interests, but a covenant protects relationships. A covenant exists between people who understand they are part of one another. It involves a vow to serve the relationship that is sealed by love."

It is interesting to consider this idea of covenant as it relates to why we get ourselves out of bed early on a Sunday morning and put off golf, or a trip to the lake or doing the yard work for a couple of hours so that we can go to the church and worship the Lord. When we come to church (even on those days when we might prefer to do something else) it's not just because we seek to get something out of the experience for ourselves - although that is often the case. We don't come to church simply to get on God's good side, or to impress our friends and neighbors with how "holy" we are. We come to church for each other. To support each other. To encourage each other. To watch each other's families grow and change. We come to church to offer our prayers, to share our lives, share our burdens and share our joys. We come to church because we live in covenant with one another, because as David Brooks writes, "a covenant protects relationships...a covenant exists between people who understand they are part of one another."

A couple weeks ago I shared a story about a lady named Eunice Holz. Eunice has a son who goes to the University of Wisconsin in Madison. One day she asked her son why he never studied in his dorm room. And her son replied, "When I really need to study, I always go to one of the campus libraries. When I see all those people reading and studying and concentrating, it convinces me to get at it too."

That's what happens when we come to church. We motivate each other to keep moving on our journey of faith. So in the coming months as you consider your church attendance, I encourage to remember that you live in covenant with your church family at First Presbyterian Church. We are a part of one another. When you are here on Sunday morning, you are not here simply for yourself — you are here for the other people who take time for worship. You are here to refresh and be refreshed.

"Making a Difference in Guatemala" focus of Medical Missions Coffee

The 67th annual Medical Missions Coffee will be held Wednesday, June 29 at the home of Terry Narr (1911 Oak Knoll Lane NW) from 1-3 p.m. At 1:45 p.m. Marylynn Aalderks will talk about her recent experience in Guatemala.

Between 2004 and 2014 Marylynn went to Nicaragua ten times as a volunteer with Save a Generation (SAG), which provides food to children who live in extreme poverty. Over the past 12 years, the feeding program has grown so that SAG now provides five meals a week to 3000 children. It also provides support and Christian education to Nicaraguan pastors in ten remote villages. The American mission teams provide medicine and volunteer medical services (with follow-up from a Nicaraguan physician), food for families in need, school uniforms for the children, and Bible School.

Although this program was feeding people, it was not "teaching them how to fish." On a 2012 mission trip with First Presbyterian Church of Fort Dodge, Iowa, to Guatemala, Marylynn met Lisa de Mena, who has started *Small Change for Big Change* based near Antigua. Lisa's program focuses on helping the Guatemalan people in this economically challenged area to take opportunities to be more independent. Her program is structured towards sustainability and independence and provides people with a "hand-up." It is this program that Marylynn will talk about.

Last November Marylynn and her husband Ken went to Guatemala and helped a family start a tilapia pond so they would have fish to eat and could sell some of the fish to be able to buy the fingerlings to start another crop of fish. They also brought books for the children. (Note the picture).

Marylynn is interested in many aspects of mission work and is the leader for the group that will be leading a Vacation Bible School at the Bdecan Presbyterian Church on the Spirit Lake Reservation in North Dakota in July.

Capital Campaign reaches halfway point in fundraising effort

The older I get, the faster time flies. It doesn't seem like it, but it has been nine years since First Presbyterians were last asked to pledge for improvements to our church home. Yes, that was clear back in 2007. And the need this time is substantially less; \$320,000 this time vs. \$3,000,000 then. As of this writing we are at \$177,437, or about half way to the goal. This includes over \$138,000 from 63 pledges and just under \$40,000 from miscellaneous income already in hand and a donation from our Capital Reserve Fund.

A unique feature of this campaign is that you aren't being asked to imagine what it will look like when it is completed. You can already see much of the finished product. I like the new feel of the social hall. The new chairs are comfortable and attractive. And it's nice knowing that the new floor tile are being held down by glue that no longer contains asbestos. Check out the music room below the sanctuary. Our young musicians in First Players love their new quarters. Here again, asbestos has been abated. Go to the multipurpose room. This room has been the venue for the rummage sale, a theater production by Words Players, supper for the Luther College Choir, numerous small group meetings, and three sessions of our new monthly Friday evening Sitter Service. There is lots of space for the youngsters to roam in a safe environment. The final area to be disturbed is the church kitchen. That work will progress over the next two months and will result in a modern kitchen that is "code compliant."

More pledges needed to complete projects

The Implementation Committee has been hard at work the past several months to bring about these improvements. They have donated their own time and expertise and used volunteer assistance when it was available. They have accomplished a lot with minimal financial support. The Finance Committee is now conducting a capital campaign to cover the cost of the improvements plus approximately 10% for missions [both local and foreign]. The 10% component for missions is consistent with our past practice which was recommended to us by our presbytery based on the principle that we should be willing to spend something on others when we spend on ourselves.

Pledge cards were mailed to all of our church families a month ago. Please give serious consideration to making a pledge. We have tried to make this affordable by providing a three-year period for payment of pledges. Our goal is to provide a welcoming environment where every individual can express their faith while enjoying the fellowship of others in our church.

Dos and don'ts of safe driving

Car accidents cause more than 2.3 million injuries, \$6 billion in damages and losses, and over 32,000 deaths in the United States each year, and are the leading cause of death for people ages 1-54 (CDC). Driving safety is another area

of health that we need to consider mindfully!

- 1) **Don't drink and drive**, and don't let friends drink and drive! Alcohol greatly impairs driving ability.
- 2) Wear your seatbelt! Seat belts really do save lives and reduce injuries by about half according to the CDC.
- 3) If driving kids keep them in an age-appropriate car seat as long as possible and do not move them to the front seat until age 13 (according to the Minnesota DPS).
- 4) **Don't drive distracted**. Put your phone in the back seat. Get off the phone when others are driving. Driving while on the phone kills, too.
- 5) **Don't drive sleepy!** Get enough sleep and watch the medications you take. If you are yawning frequently or drift into the rumble strip, it's time to take a break and maybe a nap. Caffeine, sips of water, energizing music (no lullabies!), audio books and snacks are all ways to keep you alert.
- 6) **Do watch out for pedestrians.** They always have the right of way. Be especially careful on neighborhood streets where toddlers and new bike riders can get away from their parents. School and neighborhood speed limits are there to protect the kids!
- 7) With summer coming, watch out for motorcycles! Be especially careful with your blind spots. If your other vehicle is a motorcycle, wear a helmet and appropriate clothing!


