This month the Bdecan VBS team is gathering school supplies for the children of the Bdecan Church on the Spirit Lake Reservation in North Dakota. Needed items are crayons, markers, pens, pencils, colored pencils, erasers, safety scissors, glue sticks, notebooks, rulers, and folders.

We are also collecting new socks and underwear in sizes for school-aged children, both for boys and girls, so they have these for school. There is a box in the atrium in which to place donated items or you can turn them in at the office.

If you would like to make a cash donation, these funds will be used to purchase snow pants, boots, shoes, underwear and socks for the Bdecan kids. Due to the extreme winters in northern North Dakota, the children need warm winter clothing to wear while they wait outside in the cold and wind for the school buses. If you are donating funds, please mark "Bdecan Project" in the memo line of your check and put it in the offering plate or drop it off at the office.


Sunday Worship at 9:30 a.m.

On our Presbyterian Planning calendars, there is a note on June 19. At the bottom of the daily calendar box it says "Juneteenth."

Juneteenth is a holiday that most white Americans don't know

much about and most African Americans know very well. *Juneteenth* is the oldest known celebration of the ending of slavery. From its origin in 1865 (two years after the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863) in Galveston, Texas, the observance of June 19 as the African American Emancipation Day has spread across the United States and beyond.

Today *Juneteenth* commemorates African American freedom and emphasizes education and achievement. It is a day, sometimes a week, and in some areas, a month marked with celebrations, guest speakers, worship gatherings and family reunions, centered on barbecue, strawberry soda and jazz music (depending on the region). It is a time for reflection and rejoicing. It is a time for assessment, self-improvement and for planning the future.

In cities across the country, people of all races, nationalities and religions are joining hands to truthfully acknowledge a period in our history that shaped and continues to influence our society today.

On Sunday, June 17 (the closest Sunday to *Juneteenth*), we will be celebrating Father's Day and having a cookout after worship, hosted by the Welcome and Nurture Committee. During our worship, we will be doing some liturgical pieces centered on *Juneteenth*. I hope you'll join us for some good food and the recognition that we are all created equal, but we still have a long way to go to overcome our history.

FORUMS@FIRST presents timely program on diabetes

Thanks to those who attended the excellent presentation on April 24. The panel presentations were very informative and the discussion with questions following the presentation was great.

One of the panelists, **Melanie Brennan**, D.P.T., has developed an acclaimed program for preventing Type II diabetes. This program is covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and some insurance companies.

Melanie says in her brochures, "1 out of every 3 American adults has prediabetes, and most of them do not know it. Having prediabetes means your blood glucose (sugar) level is higher than normal but not high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes This raises your risk of Type II diabetes, heart disease, and stroke."



Practice lightning awareness

During June we commemorate Lightning Safety Awareness Week, a time to remember to stay safe during our beautiful, dramatic and dangerous summer storms. Job 37:3-4 describes the beauty of lightning: "Under the whole

heaven [God] lets it go, and his lightning to

the corners of the earth. After it his voice roars; he thunders with his majestic voice, and he does not restrain the lightnings when his voice is heard." Despite its beauty, lightning is dangerous, killing over 50 people in the United States each year and injuring many more. Here are 5 tips for summer storm safety:

- 1) When thunder roars, go indoors! Stay inside for 30 minutes after the last rumble.
 - 2) If caught outdoors, do not seek shelter under trees.
- 3) If in your car, avoid contact with charging devices and metal surfaces.
- 4) If indoors during a storm, avoid corded phones, electrical cords, plumbing, concrete surfaces, doors and windows for maximum safety.
- 5) If someone you are with is struck by lightning, it is okay to touch them to assist or start CPR they do not remain electrified after they are struck.

A church or a club?

Rev. Theodore Wedel, a former canon of the National Cathedral, once told a parable about congregational life. It began: "On a dangerous sea coast where shipwrecks often occur, there was a crude little life-saving station. The building was just a hut, and there was only one boat, but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea."

Some neighbors and people who'd been rescued began donating time and money, thinking the station needed better furnishings and equipment. As the station grew as a gathering place, members hired lifeboat crews to do the dirty work of saving lives. Those who disagreed with that approach broke away to form their own stations.

The parable concluded: "If you visit that sea coast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are still frequent in those waters, but most of the people drown."


