The Lenten season has traditionally been a time when Christians attend to the cultivation of the things of the spirit. For many of us there are too few opportunities to slow down and reflect upon the direction of our hectic, consumer-driven existence. The season of Lent invites us to take time to attend to those aspects of our lives that we often neglect.

The Bemidji Choir, founded in 1937 by Carl O.

Thompson, is the premier ensemble at Bemidji State University. Membership is by audition and is open to all majors.

The Bemidji Choir has been accepted by audition to perform at numerous state and regional conventions, including the

2003 ACDA National Convention in New York City. The choir has also gained an international reputation for excellence, representing the United States five times at the international choral festival, The Europa Cantat in France, Austria, Belgium, Switzerland, and Spain; and at the Zimriya, the World Assembly of Choirs in Israel.

Each year the Bemidji Choir takes a regional tour during the spring semester, and an international tour every three years. This year, the choir is traveling to Latvia and Estonia in May.



Channel One promotes Minnesota FoodShare

This year's Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign is here! Every March, the community comes together to collect food and funds to keep the shelves at the Channel One Supplemental Food Shelf stocked. This is the largest food and fund drive Channel One hosts each year. First Presbyterian Church has always been a big contributor to the success of the campaign.

Minnesota FoodShare traces beginnings to 1982

Minnesota FoodShare, a major program of the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches (GMCC), began its work in 1982, with a campaign advanced by congregations to restock food shelves in the 7-county Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. The effort was so successful, and the need was so evident, that it became a statewide program just one year later.

Today, the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign brings together various Minnesota organizations, businesses, and places of worship to help keep 300 food shelves statewide stocked throughout the year. The March Campaign is the largest grassroots food and fund drive in the state, having raised \$7.9 million dollars and 5.2 million pounds of food in 2016, the most successful campaign in its 34-year history.

We envision a Minnesota where all residents have access to healthy food and no one suffers from hunger. The March Campaign addresses those issues directly, and we'd love to have you join the fight against hunger. By increasing awareness and advocating for long-term solutions to hunger in our communities, together we can meet the needs of those who need it most.

Care for Your Kidneys

March is National Kidney Month. I love kidneys - the kidneys are silent, invisible on the outside, and critical to our health as they filter waste out of our blood. They remind me of the quiet, dedicated members of our church who do

so much good behind the scenes. 1 Corinthians 12:22 reminds us "...the parts of the body which seem to be weaker are indispensable."

Unfortunately we usually don't think about our kidneys until they have problems. The National Kidney Foundation recommends seven things to keep those kidneys working.

First, get tested for heart disease and kidney disease.

Second, eat a healthy diet with many fruits, vegetables, Omega 3's, and low in the saturated fats and cholesterol that affect our vessels.

Third, exercise to strengthen your heart and control weight. **Fourth,** if you have high cholesterol, take action to correct that and save those blood vessels.


Fifth, control high blood pressure to protect your kidneys. Sixth, take action to avoid or control diabetes.
