# A Festival of Music welcomes Augustana University Choir




The Augustana Choir (Sioux Falls SD) has a rich history spanning nearly 100 years. The Choir was founded in 1921 and chartered by the faculty of Augustana College to "serve God, the Church, and our school" through choral music. In the words of the choir's

founding conductor, Dr. Carl Youngdahl, the choir would "perform *a cappella* and could thereby appear in the smallest of churches as well as the largest and our concert would be a sermon in song." Today the choir continues to bring sacred choral music of the highest caliber to people around the world.

Long recognized as one of the preeminent *a cappella* choral ensembles, the choir is noted for the honesty of its presentation and its recognition of the importance of maintaining Lutheran choral traditions. In addition to touring the United States, they also regularly embark on overseas performance tours. Over the past ten years, they have appeared in international concert venues on six tours, sharing their music with the people of France, England, Norway, Austria, Wales, Germany, Ireland, and Italy. Plans are underway for a tour of Norway during the group's 100th anniversary year (2021). Members of the choir represent all academic majors.

Please come enjoy this talented group of young people! A dessert reception will follow the concert. There is no admission fee for the concert, but a freewill offering will be taken.

Lately I've been engrossed in Adam Hamilton's new book "The Walk: Five Essential Practices of the Christian Life" in preparation for this year's Lenten study. One of these practices is listening and paying attention. Hamilton puts that

into the context of listening and paying attention to the movement of God in your life. But listening and paying attention is something that applies to our practical, everyday lives and dealings with each other, as well as with God.

Author Kate Murphy has written a book called You're Not Listening. In her research, she asked people a simple question - "Who listens to you?" Initially that question stumped a lot of people, but most could come up with one or two people in their lives who listened to them, usually a spouse, parent, best friend, or sibling. Many admitted that they didn't have anyone who truly listened to them. A few said they talk to pastor or rabbi only in a time of crisis. Murphy found that most people who listen are paid to do it - therapists, life coaches, hairdressers and astrologers. So listening and paying attention, not only to God, but also to each other, is an important spiritual practice, one we need a lot more of in our society.

The billionaire investor Warren Buffett once told CNBC that one of the best pieces of advice he ever got came from a CEO who told him, "Warren, you can always tell someone off tomorrow." The point was that it's important to hold one's tongue in a heated moment. What needs to be said can be said later, without an emotional outburst. What is really needed is the ability to listen, and not respond in anger, paying attention not only to what someone is saying, but why they are saying it. That spiritual practice is a good one to develop in this season of Lent.

# March is Minnesota FoodShare month

This year's Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign is here! Every March, the community comes together to collect food and funds to keep the shelves at the Channel One Supplemental Food Shelf stocked. This is the largest food and fund drive Channel One hosts each year. First Presbyterian Church has always been a big contributor to the success of the campaign.

### Minnesota FoodShare traces beginnings to 1982

Minnesota FoodShare, a major program of the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches (GMCC), began its work in 1982, with a campaign advanced by congregations to restock food shelves in the 7-county Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. The effort was so successful, and the need was so evident, that it became a statewide program just one year later.

Today, the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign brings together various Minnesota organizations, businesses, and places of worship to help keep 300 food shelves statewide stocked throughout the year. The March Campaign is the largest grassroots food and fund drive in the state, having raised \$7.9 million dollars and 5.2 million pounds of food in 2016, the most successful campaign in its 34-year history.

We envision a Minnesota where all residents have access to healthy food and no one suffers from hunger. The March Campaign addresses those issues directly, and we'd love to have you join the fight against hunger. By increasing awareness and advocating for long-term solutions to hunger in our communities, together we can meet the needs of those who need it most.

# Chancel Choir and orchestra present Elgar's *Te Deum* and *Benedictus* March 15

I am grateful for this congregation's tradition of supporting festive musical offerings from time to time. Please join me in joyfully anticipating the next big musical offering at FPC: Cantata Sunday, March 15.

The Chancel Choir will be joined by an orchestra made up of 37 musicians from FPC and the extended Rochester community (with some visitors from the Twin Cities, and students and professors from Luther College). We are eagerly preparing a masterwork which was written in 1897 for the now world famous "Three Choirs Festival," held at Hereford Cathedral that year. Edward Elgar is the composer of *Te Deum and Benedictus, Op. 34*. These two expansive texts will be sung in English and represent a 1700-year history and development over those centuries of Christian spirituality, thought, and the nature of praise.

Additionally, the choir will sing a motet based on the gospel reading that day which recounts the story of Jesus and the woman at the well. The orchestra will offer the beloved "Nimrod" movement from Elgar's *Enigma Variations* as well as a related *Elegy for Strings* - both pieces are dedicated to the same close acquaintance to the composer.

Rounding out the Anglo-inspired repertoire is a final hymn accompanied by orchestra, "O God Beyond all Praising," sung to *Thaxted*: the well-known tune from Gustav Holst's "Jupiter" (The Planets).

This is an incredible undertaking for any congregation and I am grateful for the extra financial support our Endowment Committee, and especially **Don Scholz** are providing in memory of Don's late wife, **Georgia.** I hope that this will serve to celebrate the strength of our worship ministries and further the vision of our mutual musical future to the glory of God alone.


