# Capital Campaign launched to raise money for building improvements

Amazing things are happening at FPC!

- ★ If you've been in the social hall recently you've seen the new flooring, new paint job, and new chairs. You don't see the work that went into asbestos abatement when we removed the old tile, but we did that too.
- ★ If you've been in the Great Room, now referred to as the Multipurpose Room, you've been amazed at the transformation from an unfinished basement to a room with many possibilities, including a finished floor, painted walls, enhanced audio-video capabilities, a lounge area, and a play space and equipment for children.
- ★ If you've been in the two former Sunday school rooms under the sanctuary, you've seen the change from two small, dingy classrooms/storerooms into one large room with new flooring, rug, and paint job that turned the area into a great place for our children's choirs and First Players to rehearse.

We were able to accomplish all this with the help of enormous hours of volunteer help, a grant and a loan from the church's Capital Reserve fund, and some early donations from members.

★ If you've been in the main kitchen, you know that's yet to be done. This month volunteers and construction workers will essentially strip the kitchen and prepare it for installation of new cabinets, new appliances, and upgrades that will bring it up to code. We expect the work to be completed by the end of July.

Now the time has come to make paying for all the projects a priority. You have already received information from the Capital Campaign committee that explains in more detail the money we need to raise. The cost of the projects, including a component for outreach (mission and social concerns) and contingencies, is \$320,000 and it is that amount that we need you to help us raise. We are asking you to consider making a pledge to be paid over a three-year period, although we would gladly accept a pledge paid in full early in the period.

Included in the mailing was a pledge card, a return envelope, and a form to fill out and return to the church if you'd like to have your pledge automatically deducted from your checking or saving account.

Thank you for your part in helping us grow as a faith fellowship with up-to-date facilities to better serve our congregation and our community.

★ And if you haven't been in these places yet, you really need to check them out. You'll be amazed!

# Worship set for 9:30 a.m. during the summer

Two years ago we asked the congregation to complete a survey about their preferred hours for summer worship services. A large majority of respondents preferred one service in the summer and suggested a number of times. After a lot of discussion about the merits of the front-runners 9 a.m. or 9:30 a.m., the Worship and Music Committee voted for 9 a.m. and that's when we worshiped two summers ago.

In response to a number of requests, the Worship and Music Committee then reconsidered the options and chose to hold worship services at 9:30 a.m. last summer. Services will be at the same time this summer! The 9:30 a.m. hour will go from Memorial Day Sunday (May 29) through Labor Day Sunday (September 4).



# Bdecan Mission Team invites you to join them in tying fleece blankets

The Bdecan Mission Team has discovered that each year on the Spirit Lake Indian Reservation in North Dakota, nearly 100 children find themselves in short-term or long-term foster care. When they reach their foster family, the only personal items which accompany them are the clothes they are wearing.

In an attempt to provide as many children as possible with a tangible object that is theirs alone, we're asking each of you to consider becoming part of our team as we reach our goal of creating 40 to 50 blankets for these children who are entering foster care.

We are in need both of fleece and of people to tie the blankets. For each blanket, two coordinating pieces of fleece, 45 inches square, is needed. Anyone wishing to contribute material is asked to purchase 2 pieces (1 1/4 yards long), wash the fabric in cold water, and trim it to 45 inches by 45 inches. There will be a container in the atrium starting May 1. Please place your fabric there by May 8 so we know how much additional fleece to buy. Monetary contributions for the purchase of additional fabric is also welcome.

Everyone in the congregation is invited to a "time for tying" on Saturday morning, May 14 in the social hall. We will meet from 9 - 12 (come whenever it's convenient for you). Coffee, tea, juice, milk and breakfast pastries will be provided. No experience is necessary—you just need to be able to tie a knot!

Please join us in showing our love to these children.

### Mission dollars serve needs around the world

In April the Mission Committee, on your behalf, dealt with issues of self-development, education, medical assistance, and disaster relief. Each of the following projects received \$1000 from our mission funds.

The Cooperative Development Project helps 68 communities and 1400 farmers in the Leogane area of Haiti to improve lives through agriculture. Because of deforestation, the first task was to reforest the area to make agriculture possible. Sixteen million trees have been planted, and since then 1990 contour ditches have been dug to prevent erosion. Cisterns have been installed as well as 30 fish ponds. Current needs are for a sawmill and education and leadership development.

Forman Christian College, Lahore, Pakistan. Last year we supported the building of the Light of Hope School, an oncampus elementary school for children of their lower staff. It opened with 180 students, Grades K-5. Now they want to expand the school to Grade 10, which will double enrollment. Two floors will be added to house the extra classrooms. Forman is only two miles from the site of the bomb blast on Easter Sunday, killing 70 people. Essential security measures were updated this year, including new campus-wide infrared cameras, parking lot lights, biometric identification cards and entrance turnstiles.

Ministry of Hope, Malawi. Malawi has been experiencing its worst food crisis since the famine of 2002. Over two million people face a severe food shortage because of the current famine. Gifts from churches and individuals have allowed the Ministry of Hope to provide one meal a day for the 2400 orphans it cares for as well as distributing food to vulnerable families in the villages. These include 1772 households headed by orphans, widows, and those with disabilities or HIV/AIDS.

Christian Mission Hospital, Rajshahi, Bangladesh. Drs. Les and Cindy Morgan have worked for 22 years with Santals in this area. Most Santals do not own their own land but instead work as daily laborers in the surrounding rice fields. Earning about \$1.50 a day, they live in mud-walled homes with dirt floors and tin roofs and cook on mud stoves molded over small pits in the ground. Many Santals cannot afford basic health care so Les runs a small clinic in the villages and visits the sick in their homes. The Church of Bangladesh is setting up a program to advocate for health care access for the Santal people. The PCUSA supports this outreach and helps Santals receive care at the Christian Mission Hospital through contributions to a medical assistance fund.

An update on the Syrian Refugee situation: The National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL) began the Educational Ministry for Syrian Refugees Project to help reduce illiteracy among Syrian refugees, beginning with those living in the Bekaa region. They have begun with two schools, one in the village of Kib Elias, the other in Reyak. A third in the area of Minyara will be open this spring, followed by a school in Tyre. These will serve 250 Syrian refugee children.


