## Mission Team returns to Spirit Lake Indian Reservation

For the fourth year the Bdecan VBS team is planning to provide Vacation Bible School (VBS) to the children of the Bdecan Church on the Spirit Lake Reservation in North Dakota. This year's trip will run from July 10 through July 15. The VBS lessons will be about Leah and Rachel, the Tower of Babel, and the woman who washed Jesus' feet with her tears.

Now we need your help. Last year when we were in North Dakota we talked with Joe Obermeyer, the youth pastor, and the women of the church and asked them what the children most need. They told us they always need school supplies and warm winter clothing. Often coats, hats and mittens are donated, but not snow pants, boots, shoes, underwear and socks. They asked if funds could be provided to help purchase these items so each child in the church could receive the clothing they need in their size.

The children's parents do not own cars, so the children MUST take the bus to get to school. It is cold and very windy in northern North Dakota making warm winter clothes a necessity. Many of the children already struggle to keep up with their classes and we do not want them to fall farther behind due to missing school because it is too cold to wait outside for the bus. The Bdecan Church really encourages the children of the church to go to school.

We are going to have a box in the atrium in June and are asking for donations of pencils, crayons, glue sticks, rulers, markers, colored pencils, scissors, notebooks, folders and erasers. We would also be happy to receive donations of underwear and socks for school aged children (both boys and girls).

In addition, if anyone is willing to donate money to the Bdecan project, we would send that money to the Bdecan Mission Project to be used to buy the snow pants, shoes and boots the kids so badly need when they stand outside and wait for the school bus in the winter.

First Presbyterian Church has been incredibly generous in supporting our ministry there. We thank all the members of First Presbyterian Church for their kind support for this mission project.

### Friendship Place serves students in Meadow Park area

Friendship Place continues to have a successful year with its afterschool program and tutoring at night. Children who attend the after school program on Wednesdays enjoy food provided by PW. We try to introduce them to new, healthy foods as well as providing the fruits and vegetables they enjoy.

We have between twenty and thirty students coming for tutoring each Wednesday night and we are pleased to see the progress they are making. Many of the older boys, as well as the girls, now take their education very seriously. Recently one of our evening students won a runner-up scholarship in the Beat the Odds competition. Now a student at RCTC, she is interested in becoming a health services professional. We can always use more tutors, and we encourage you to try helping out on a Wednesday night from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

We are currently working on a grant that would allow us to expand the raised gardens behind the back fence. Last summer several families from the Meadow Park apartment complex grew food in raised gardens and were pleased with the produce. Grant funding would allow us to construct more gardens for the families in the apartments as well as offering classes in nutrition and food preparation.

There is going to be a fundraiser to benefit Friendship Place on Monday, May 7 from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Chipotle at 1201 South Broadway Suite 60. Pick up a flyer in the church office, show it on your smartphone or tell the cashier you're supporting Friendship Place. Fifty percent of the proceeds will be donated to Friendship Place. # Confirmation Class of 2018 write Faith Statements

The Confirmation Class of 2018 – Clara Braun, Cameron Domnick and Josh Ellefson – will be received into membership

during worship on Sunday, May 13 at 11 a.m.

Each year the goal of Confirmation is to help students begin to live out their faith in a church community. Over the course of the year we talk about different aspects of faith and church, including the Presbyterian denomination – its history, worship traditions, sacraments, organization and form of government.

We also discuss important stories, people and events in the Bible. Each student participates in worship as acolyte and also through completing a handful of *Sermon Notes* worksheets in which they formally analyze sermons. They also attended Session meetings and the Annual Meeting. All in all, the idea is to provide experiences and information to help students *begin* shaping their faith and growing in their understanding of FPC and church in general.

As always, the "final project" for each student is to compose a faith statement indicating what he or she believes at this moment in their life. Here are excerpts of their statements.

Clara Braun: I believe that church is a place where children-elders can come to worship and learn about faith. I believe the church can help us learn about God. I believe the church helps bring families together and is a place to meet new people. I believe the church supports the members of our church and others outside of church. I want to be active and a member of this church because I want to help more.

Cameron Domnick: I believe that church is a place to become closer to the Lord. I believe the church can give people an education on the Bible. I believe the church will do good things for the community. I believe the church does great things through mission. I want to be active and a member of this church because I have grown up knowing God through this church.

Josh Ellefson: I believe that church is where people go to practice religion. I believe the church can ... make people feel secure and welcome. I believe the church shows people that religion is a good thing. I believe the church does good things especially for people who don't have a lot in their lives. I want to be active and a member of this church because I think it would be important.

The class was examined and formally received into membership by the Session on Tuesday, April 17.

### New Books added to church library in May

Here are some great new books in the church library to guide your spiritual journey during these Great 50 Days of Easter/Eastertide and Pentecost:

- Easter Earthquake: How Resurrection Shakes Our World by James Harnish examines what difference Christ's resurrection makes in our lives.
- Beyond Death: What Jesus Revealed about Eternal Life by Flora Slosson Wuellner sheds light on what Jesus revealed about eternal life. Each chapter opens with a quotation from Jesus and develops the implications of those words, and closes with a guided meditation.
- Pauses for Pentecost: 50 Words for Easter People, by Trevor Hudson leads readers to focus on one word and scripture verse each day. He invites us to pause for just a few minutes to read the brief daily reflection and do a simple practice.
- Sabbath Keeping by Donna E. Schaper is a collection
  of ten meditations exploring different ways to think of
  and practice Sabbath such as Sabbath & Music,
  Sabbath & the Body, Sabbath & Prayer, Focus &
  Decluttering, Sabbath & Memory, Sabbath as the
  Relinquishing of Power, and Sabbath as Civil
  Disobedience.
- For Sabbath's Sake, Embracing Your Need for Rest, Worship, and Community by J. Dana Trent traces the rich history of Sabbath, helps readers find ways to overcome barriers to this spiritual practice, and offers achievable ways to build Sabbath into modern life.
- Spoken into Being-Divine Encounters through Story by Michael Williams shows how storytelling helps us make sense of our lives, the world around us, and God. When we tell stories, we speak a world into being just as God did in the creation accounts in Genesis. Employing poetry, personal narrative, and retellings of biblical stories, the author reveals the spiritual power of narrative as a way to encounter the divine presence anew.
- The Sacred Slow. A Holy Departure from Fast Faith by Alicia Britt Chole offers 52 devotionals featuring a short but unexpected reading and two options for application.

### **May: Watch Out for Your Eyes**



May is Healthy Vision month, a great time to think about the importance of our sight. Even Jesus reminded us to take care of our eyes: "The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, but if your eye is

bad, your whole body will be full of

darkness..." (Matthew 6:22-23 ESV).


How can you take care of your eyes?

The first step is to know your family history. Many conditions such as macular degeneration, glaucoma and retinal dystrophies are passed down through the family. Knowing your family history will help you and your doctor develop a plan to "keep an eye on things."

Secondly, it is important to get regular dilated eye exams. Drops are administered that dilate the pupil, allowing doctors a good look at the back of the eye. Doctors can look for cancer and complications from diabetes, high blood pressure, and many other conditions that can affect vision. Although not as fun as picking out glasses, the dilated eye exam is the most important part of an eye visit.

Finally, take care of your eyes by wearing sunglasses which protect against UV light. UV light exposure can lead to cataracts, macular degeneration (damage to the retina that affects central vision), and pterygium, tissue growth on the white part of the eye that affects the curve of the eyeball.
