and has won many awards, including the "Prix Conrad-Letendre," the Holtkamp-AGO Composition Award, and first prize in the Marilyn Mason New Organ Music Competition. A feature-length program

devoted to her work as a composer and organist, titled "Rachel's Children," was broadcast by American Public Media's PIPEDREAMS in October 2012.

Well known as an improviser, Laurin has taught this art in schools, workshops, and academies across Canada and USA. She has composed more than a hundred works for various solo instruments, voice, instrumental ensembles, choir, and orchestra, including a piano concerto and a concerto for organ, string orchestra and timpani. Her compositions are recognized internationally and have been performed and recorded on the five continents. She composes almost exclusively on commissions and always has a work in progress.

Laurin was born in St-Benoît des Deux-Montagnes, Québec, Canada. She was Associate Organist at St-Joseph's Oratory, Montreal from 1986-2002 and Titular Organist at Notre


Dame Cathedral, Ottawa from 2002-2006. She has been a member of the "Comité d'Honneur de la Fédération Francophone des Amis de l'Orgue" since 2016.

Exercising our gratitude muscles

Expressing gratitude isn't just a good thing to do; it also appears to be good for us! Indiana University researchers found that participants who performed gratitude-focused writing exercises felt uplifted, and were more likely to express gratefulness through generosity, even weeks later.

Though the study was small, we seem to have a "gratitude muscle" that can be strengthened through exercise. If so, there may be more than we thought to the popularity of gratitude journals and Mom's insistence that we write thankyou notes. Not to mention the biblical call to "give thanks to the LORD, for he is good" (1 Chronicles 16:34, for example).

Might God have hardwired us for gratitude — not only at Thanksgiving but year round — because it's good for us as well as for those we thank? To that, we respond, "Thanks be to God!" ~ Newsletter Newsletter 11/2017

- From here you have two options. You can search by Email using my email address (duffer45@gmail.com) or if you are already a member, you can logon to the website using the same credentials you use for other sign up activities.
- If you use the search by Email function, you will get both the 2017 Liturgist sign-up and the 2017 Advent Wreath sign-up lists. Simply open the 2017 Advent Wreath list and follow the instructions to sign up. You can also use these instructions to change your sign up if necessary.

A workshop on dealing with dementia issues

Statistically speaking, up to 1 in 10 church members over the age of 65 are living with dementia.

- · How can we remain connected to them as a church?
- How can we better understand their experience and learn skills to support and communicate with them?
- What does it mean to become a "dementia-friendly" congregation?

Come and learn on Sunday, November 5 during the education hour (9:45-10:45 a.m.) in the social hall. *Remember Those Who Forget* is a workshop exploring how congregations can better serve persons with dementia, their families and caregivers.

The workshop is led by **Rev. Cindy Ray**, Executive Director of the Presbyterian Association of Homes & Services for the Aging (PAHSA). She is a member of the Dementia Friendly America National Council and a Dementia Champion for ACTonAlzheimer's, MN. Before joining PAHSA, Cindy served for over 25 years as pastor of congregations in Florida, Missouri and Minnesota.

Cindy has written for Presbyterian Outlook, Horizons, These Days devotional magazine and several Twin Cities area news publications. She is a member of the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area, a past moderator, and currently serves as a presbytery trustee and member of the Presbytery Leadership Team. - November is both Lung Cancer

Awareness and COPD month, so it's time to pay attention to the two organs we most take for granted – lungs. Lung cancer is considered one of the most stigmatized cancers because of its association with smoking.

While smoking does cause most lung cancers, many of those who suffer with lung cancer have never smoked. COPD is another disease associated with smoking that occurs as the tissues in the lungs lose elasticity and become plugged with mucous, causing shortness of breath and wheezing.

So how can you take care of your lungs?

- Avoid smoking and smoke! If you need resources to quit, let the parish nurse know at fpcparishnursing@gmail.com
- 2. If you have smoked, talk to your physician about a possible low-dose CT scan
- Seek medical attention for symptoms like a persistent cough, shortness of breath, or coughing up blood
- 4. Exercise! It's good for your lungs and the rest of the body
- If you are on treatment for asthma or COPD, follow your treatment regimen and avoid things that trigger your symptoms.


