

2018 Sharing Tree brings Christmas spirit to many

We are again offering you an opportunity to help children, families and those who are homeless in our community during the Christmas season. From November 11 through December 2 a Christmas tree in the atrium will be decorated with colored gift tags, each representing a charitable organization in Rochester. This year we are

organization in Rochester. This year we are adding a new one, Brighter Tomorrows, to our list.

- Brighter Tomorrows (assists families who have encountered a childhood cancer diagnosis)
- Medcity Foundation (Kristina Hesby's organization that provides general assistance to blood cancer patients and their families. This includes lodging, food and other financial needs.)
- Alternative Learning Center Daycare (gifts for infant children whose high school parents are finishing high school credits at the ALC)
- 4) Family Promise (also known as Interfaith Hospitality Network. Family Promise provides assistance for homeless families in the way of housing, meals, daycare, and employment.)

We are setting up the tree earlier this year, starting with Brighter Tomorrows gift tags, since those gifts need to be delivered by the end of November. Our church youth group will be wrapping and delivering these gifts. Deadline for returning the other gifts is December 9.

Select a gift tag off the tree and purchase the item or items on the tag. As far as wrapping the gift, follow the instructions on the tag. It is important that you attach the tag to the gift when you return it to the church office so we know to which organization the gift should be delivered.

Instead of purchasing a gift there is also the option of purchasing a gift card from one of our local stores. Put the card in an envelope and drop it off in the church office.

Brass Roots Trio returns to A Festival of Music season

In April of 2017 **Brass Roots Trio** appeared in our *A Festival of Music* series. This month we welcome them back to First Presbyterian Church!

With trumpet, French horn and piano, Brass Roots Trio creates symphonic sounds making three instruments sound like a

small orchestra. The trio thrills audiences with instrumental virtuosity plus the bonus of a brilliant operatic tenor.

Their lively program, "American Impressions," is a musical travelogue that takes the listener from the Old West to New York with music ranging from Aaron Copland's "Rodeo" to Leonard Bernstein's "West Side Story." The trio brings to life memories of the Mississippi River boats and the musical legends that they carried from New Orleans, the southern gospel revivals and the haunting beauty of the Native American Flute. "American Impressions" is a heartwarming program that will stir the emotions!

Now in its 14th season, Brass Roots Trio has played to standing ovations and rave reviews in every corner of the US and UK including a performance at the White House in 2009.

Travis Heath (trumpet and flugelhorn), Douglas Lundeen (French horn, Native American Flute and vocalist) and Rosetta Senkus Bacon (piano) infuse their music with passion and exuberant energy, and their warmhearted presentation establishes an immediate connection with the audience. Exhilarating performances and imaginative programming have established Brass Roots Trio as one of the most compelling ensembles of the 21st century.

Social Concerns evaluates programs we support

The Social Concerns Committee has been busy looking at each worthy cause we have supported in the recent past. Some programs have been going on for years and we realize needs in Rochester may have changed – there are more homelessness, addiction problems and immigration concerns. We will continue to contribute to the main programs we have supported even as we search out new areas of need. Each month we will also highlight two programs our church supports.

Programs old revisited and new added

For many years we have supported a very important program that makes a difference in the health of people who do not have the resources to pay for most of their needs – the **Salvation Army Medical and Dental Clinics**. This is a free service for these people and our donation is used directly for their care.

This year we added **Zumbro Valley Mental Health Connections and Referrals** unit – basically detox for addiction problems of all sorts. The staff assures a safe detox and counselors help with referrals to addiction treatment centers. This unit deals with a large homeless population who are so inadequately dressed for our cold weather their health is at risk. Our money will be used to buy sweat clothes and warm socks. Walmart has agreed to not charge full price for these things so the money will be stretched even further. Again, the entire donation will be used for the homeless people the unit serves.

We are also looking for anyone interested in being on our committee. Please call **Tom Pileggi** (507-261-7068) if you would like to be part of this very important endeavor.

How can I get on the C.A.R.E. list? We're here to serve you!

Deacons minister to C.A.R.E. members

C.A.R.E. stands for Contact, Assist, Relate, and Encourage. Everyone on our care/homebound list is not bound to their home all the time, but constitute a group of special people who would benefit from having periodic contact with a Deacon. Often a friend suggests someone should be on the list; sometimes people call themselves and ask to be on the list. Depending on their situation, some people are permanently on the list; some are on it temporarily. Part of the list is a "Deacons' Care List" for those who don't want to be labeled "homebound" or "shut-in."

Members who are on the list receive periodic visits from a Deacon; receive an Easter lily at Easter and a poinsettia at Christmas; and allow us to show we care about you even when you can't attend church regularly.

If you know of someone whom the Deacons should consider, or if you would like to be on the list, call **Rev. Jay Rowland** (282-1618), ministerial liaison with the Deacons.

Present Over Perfect

by Shauna Niequist

Author Shauna Niequist loved her life and her work. But she wasn't *enjoying* her life or her work. She yearned for connection, meaning, depth but "settled for busy." She was living "a set of beliefs and instincts" which were not hers, an elusive image of perfection. And she was wearing out at age thirty-six. Her health deteriorated.

This book is her invitation to join her struggle to live a different model, leaving behind "the pressure to be perfect and begin the life-changing practice of simply being present, in the middle of the mess and the ordinariness of life." While her prose at times wanders into flowery excess, her reflections and insights help the reader learn how to re-orient to life through intentional practice and spiritual principles.

Many causes have come across our desks and our hearts this year. We thank you for your generous responses to all of them.

February: CWS Blankets

In February our congregation gave \$5,410 and joined over 4000 churches across the nation in Church World Service's **Blankets** program. Besides blankets, Church World Service provides emergency supplies such as tents, mosquito nets, food, bottled water and health kits to places in the world where disaster has struck.

March: Minnesota Foodshare/Channel One

Each March we partner with other caring people in the Rochester area to help alleviate hunger. Through **Minnesota Foodshare** we joined with food shelves across Minnesota to collect donations of money and food that support local efforts to help feed people in need and reduce hunger in our community. This year First Presbyterian members contributed \$8,880 in cash plus additional donations to the food barrel.

March/April: One Great Hour of Sharing

The Mission Committee extends thanks to the congregation for their wonderful response to the **One Great Hour of Sharing** offering collected in April. FPC collected \$10,539 for this special offering that helps support Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People.

June/July: Bdecan mission project

The **Bdecan Vacation Bible School** team thanks the congregation for their generosity in donating school supplies and underwear and socks that the team took with them for schoolaged children this summer. The congregation also donated \$2,545 that will be used for snow pants, boots, shoes and underwear for winter weather.

May/June: Pentecost Offering

Each year on **Pentecost** Sunday, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit as a bringer of new life. Gifts to the Pentecost Offering help bring God's transforming, redeeming love to children at risk, guide and nurture young people's growing faith, and provide opportunities for young adults to become spiritual leaders — all in the name of Jesus Christ. This year FPC members contributed \$4,355.

In all these special causes, your dollars really do make a difference and we thank you for your generosity.

A reminder to protect


your possessions
