## Come to the Lord's Table

"For anyone who eats and drinks without recognizing the body of the Lord eats and drinks judgment on himself."

(I Corinthians 11:29 [NIV])

The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us that we are to "discern the body" when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. It is appropriate that World Communion Sunday is also a time when we receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need.

Worldwide Communion Sunday originated in Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh in 1933, was adopted throughout the U.S. Presbyterian Church in 1936, and subsequently spread to other denominations. In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches (now the National Council of Churches) endorsed World Communion Sunday and began to promote it to Christian churches worldwide.

Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

At Christ's Table we are made one with Christ and one with each other, and we are united with the church in every time and place. The unity of the Lord's table is a sign of the unity God wills for all creation. From Christ, the Table, we can go out with joy as witnesses of God's love, to work for the healing and the reconciliation of God's world.

Join Christians around the world at the celebration. Take your place at the Table on Sunday, October 7.

Place: First Presbyterian Church sanctuary


Season 28 of A Festival of Music welcomes David

Baskeyfield, concert organist and church musician originally from England and now living in upstate New York. Mr. Baskeyfield specializes in music of the French composers of the 19th and 20th centuries. Hallmarks of his music are a

compelling sense of rhythm, crystalline articulation and a truly seamless, soaring legato. His first album features music by Canadian, English and French composers recorded on the landmark Casavant organ of 1914 at St. Paul's church in Toronto.

Mr. Baskeyfield studied law and organ at St John's College, Oxford. His doctorate is from Eastman School of Music in New York. Between Oxford and Eastman he spent a



David Baskeyfield in concert First Presbyterian Church Sunday, October 14, 2018


year as organ scholar of Christ Church Cathedral and St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, accompanying or directing their choirs. He is currently Director of Music at Christ Episcopal Church, Pittsford, New York. He has been the recipient of many prizes in competition, including winning the Canadian International Organ Competition in 2014.

Aside from solo performance he enjoys work as a collaborative pianist, continuo player, and occasional cocktail pianist. He has been broadcast on American Public Media's Pipedreams, as well as NPR's With Heart and Voice and as part of the daily

playlist on the classical station WXXI in New York.

There is no admission fee to the concert, but a freewill offering will be accepted. A dessert reception will follow the concert.

October 2018

In the September 12 issue of <u>The Christian Century</u>, Peter Marty wrote a very interesting article that described curiosity as holy. Marty writes:

"In the case of our own spiritual lives, questions of God and of other people are essential to the character of faith. To be without questions of God is less an indication of confident faith and more a lack of spiritual depth.

"For people who decide that faith has more to do with obtaining answers than asking questions, writer Edward Hays has a different idea. He imagines the question mark as a holy symbol. Whereas the exclamation point '!' is emphatic and insistent, the '?' is really a bent over '!' that has bowed its head in humility. Open to a spirit of exploration and wonder, the question mark is both a prayer tool for everyday people and a creative tool of artists, geniuses, and explorer.

"In this run-up to election season, we all have friends, neighbors, perhaps family members with whom we disagree. In our conversation, let's lean on the holiness of curiosity and emphasize the humility of the question mark rather than the insistence of the exclamation. Instead of shaking our head 'No' as the other person speaks, perhaps a better response is to tilt our head and ask 'Why?' when they are finished. 'Why do you think that? That hasn't been my experience, but tell me about your experience.'"

As Marty points out, curiosity and questions are essential to the character of faith.

# Offering dedicated to bringing the peace of Christ to the world



#### **Build Those Bones**

October 20th is World Osteoporosis
Day, a great time to focus on the most important part of our bodies that we can't see (hopefully)... our bones! Osteoporosis is the condition of thinning bones. While we think of our bones as unchanging structural

elements, they are living tissues and change over time. With age and nutritional deficiencies, the honeycomb of bone can become thin and unsound and can break easily. How do we fight osteoporosis?

- 1) Build those bones! Make sure you and your kids get enough calcium and Vitamin D through diet and supplements
- 2) Work those bones! Bones benefit from weight bearing exercise walking, dancing, or running. (Sorry, swimming does not count.)
- 3) Know your bones! Follow your doctor's advice but consider getting a bone scan if you've had a fracture or are a woman past menopause, particularly if you have a family history.
- 4) Take care of your bones. Being under or overweight increases your risk of fractures. If you do receive a diagnosis of osteoporosis, take recommended medications to reduce your risk of debilitating fractures.
- 5) Fight Falls! Consider joining a class that is proven to reduce your risk of falls such as *Stepping On* or *Matter of Balance*. You can find local offerings by searching your zip code at Wellconnect.com.

### Columbarium: place of the dove

From early Christian times churches have maintained an area of the church for interring the remains of its members and loved ones.

The area was often referred to as a columbarium, the Latin word for a dove-cote: the dwelling place of a columba, a dove.

With a return to the ancient custom of cremation, it is again possible to use a columbarium as a place of interment, allowing for the ashes of the faithful to be deposited within the church property, as was common in times past.

The First Presbyterian Church Columbarium was dedicated in May 1991 in memory of Jacqueline Beth Goodyear. One hundred nine of the 192 niches have been reserved.

## Staff Pick for Library Book of the Month

## **Bad Religion**

by Ross Douthat

Ross Douthat's thoughtful book *Bad Religion* is easy to read. Perhaps that's to be expected from an author who writes regularly for the *New York Times* Op/Ed column. Even so, I'm impressed because that's not easy to do when writing about religion.

Douthat's book examines the rise of a caricature of religion and church life as an alternative to the traditional (in the best sense of the word) church our parents raised us to join and appreciate. It's a primer for understanding why people church where they do (or don't).

Bad Religion presents a substantive critique of church unduly shaped by culture and its unabashed worship and divination of wealth, celebrity and personalized preference. I don't know what's worse: the flourishing of this caricature of church, or that people may see it as representative of Every Church, rightly rejecting it but meanwhile rejecting authentic Christian faith and community in the process.

I recommend this book because it's important for us to recognize and understand this powerful modern trend and because it presents a good overview of faith and religion along the way. Disturbing though this trend may be, we can still trust (hope) that as long as churches offer authentic worship and community, like we do, God will faithfully inspire people to find and support these churches. The future of the Church no doubt depends upon it.

### Lifelong Saints


