
Who is Jesus? What a difference a lens makes!

As our headlines have been dominated by increasing violence and racism, there is good news for Presbyterians this summer! There were many hopefilled moments at the recent General Assembly meeting in Portland, Oregon that I think provide a model

for how we as a society can move forward.

For instance, **J. Herbert Nelson** was elected as our new Stated Clerk, becoming the first African-American to serve in that office.

We also elected Co-Moderators for the first time in our church's history. **Denise Anderson**, a young African-American woman, and **Jan Edmiston**, a slightly older white woman, will share the responsibilities of being Moderator for the next two years.

And finally, the PCUSA voted to add The Confession of Belhar to our Book of Confessions. This is a big deal – we haven't added anything to our Book of Confessions since 1990! With its focus on unity, reconciliation and justice, a letter from the PCUSA that accompanies the study guide on the Confession notes, "We believe that the Confession of Belhar is a profound statement that comes to us as a word from God for this particular time and place for the PCUSA."

Bishop Jackson urges church to be "prophetic, not pathetic"

In a sermon to the Assembly, AME Bishop Reginald Jackson urged the Presbyterian Church to be "prophetic, not pathetic." He said, "In our nation today we have clergy and churches in the name of the same God giving two different messages on the same subject – gun control, immigration and Christian/Muslim relations. All around the country there is a crisis of conflicting voices. Our nation today is polarized and divided."

Jackson offered three suggestions for resolving this crisis of conflicting voices.

- First, "Each of us must remain faithful. Too many of us in the faith community have stopped doing the things to remain faithful in the first place. It is not enough to know we've been called. What's more important is to know who called you."
- Second, don't be fooled by the numbers. "Too many of us get alarmed by the numbers how many are on our side, how many on the other side, who's leaving and who's staying. We capitulate; we go along to get along. The Lord has not called us to be popular; the Lord called us to be faithful."
- Thirdly, live like you know God. "We are alarmed and rattled by a whole bunch of stuff. I go to bed with the assurance that God still has the last word in this world. In the end, what God has said is going to happen. So let's be faithful. Let's speak truth to power. Let's stand on God's word and what God says to us. Let us live with the confidence that God still has the last word in this world. Let us be prophetic, not pathetic."

It is a good time to be a Presbyterian. At the national level, the PCUSA is modeling the kinds of things that our nation must do in order to deal with hate and racism – things like listening to voices previously silenced, giving power to those who have been powerless and following those who have historically been pushed out of the way. That is something to be proud of.

The role of First Presbyterian Church

On a more local level, Jay, Rick and I recently attended a Faith Forum at Bethel Lutheran Church with several prominent African-American leaders in town along with Sheriff Kevin Torgerson. In that Forum, many issues were discussed, but it all boiled down to one thing. It's easy to hate a large, faceless group categorized as "Them" – whether it's all black people, all police officers or all Muslims. But when we get to know individuals, it's much harder to hate. It's easy to hate "them," it's harder to hate someone you know. That's where racism needs to be addressed. In addition to better training for law enforcement and more community listening events to ease the tension and increase understanding, we all can make an effort to get to know individuals.

Of course, it can't end there. There's always something more to do. So I invite you to consider how we at First Presbyterian Church, in the city of Rochester, in the state of Minnesota, can be prophetic, and not pathetic.

Troubled Hearts: Anxiety Awareness

Our world is full of changes and uncertainties. It is easy to become distracted or even consumed by fear about terrorism,

money, our kids, the future... The list could go on and on!

On the health side, anxiety can lead our body to release stress hormones and contribute to high blood pressure, panic attacks, sleep problems, social isolation, substance abuse, and

depression. In John 14:1 Jesus reminds us "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me." Taking the time to remind ourselves that he is in control can help us reduce our anxiety.

1 Peter 5:7 (NIV) also encourages us to "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." In addition to giving our worries to God, exercising, socializing, and keeping a journal are a few ways to break out of the anxiety cycle. Pursuing counseling and cognitive behavioral therapy can help reframe and cope with stressors.

Finally, consider talking to your healthcare provider as there are several different medications that can address anxiety. Please email fpcparishnursing@gmail.com if you have questions for the parish nurses about community resources for anxiety.

Many causes have come across our desks and our hearts this year. We thank you for your generous responses to all of them.

February: CWS Blankets

In February our congregation gave \$5,071 and joined over 4000 churches across the nation in Church World Service's **Blankets**+ program. Besides blankets, Blankets+ provides emergency supplies such as tents, mosquito nets, food, bottled water and health kits to places in the world where disaster has struck.

March: Minnesota Foodshare/Channel One

Each March we partner with other caring people in the Rochester area to help alleviate hunger. Through **Minnesota Foodshare** we joined with food shelves across Minnesota to collect donations of money and food that support local efforts to help feed people in need and reduce hunger in our community. This year First Presbyterian members contributed \$11,212 in cash plus additional donations to the food barrel.

March/April: One Great Hour of Sharing

The Mission Committee extends thanks to the congregation for their wonderful response to the **One Great Hour of Sharing** offering collected in March and April. FPC collected \$8,229 for this special offering that helps support Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People.

June/July: Bdecan Backpack project

The **Bdecan Backpack project** is a special program this year. We collected children's backpacks and underwear, socks, T-shirts, pants or shorts, wash cloths, soap, combs and shampoo so the social worker on the Spirit Lake Indian Reservation can provide clothing and personal items for children when they are unexpectedly removed from their home and put in foster care. You responded generously and in addition we received \$1890 that was used to purchase extra t-shirts, 60 (!) pajamas, diapers, and other supplies for the backpacks.

May: Pentecost Offering

Each year on **Pentecost** Sunday, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit as a bringer of new life. Gifts to the Pentecost Offering help bring God's transforming, redeeming love to children at risk, guide and nurture young people's growing faith, and provide opportunities for young adults to become spiritual leaders – all in the name of Jesus Christ. This year FPC members contributed \$3,141.

In all these special causes, your dollars really do make a difference and we thank you for your generosity.

Presbyterian Women of the Synod gather in Sioux Falls

Two hundred women from MN, IA, WI, NE, ND, and SD attended the Synod of Lakes and Prairies Gathering of Presbyterian Women in Sioux Falls, SD June 15-18. Zoe Abrahamson, Heide Buettner, Char Ellefson, LaDonna Fay, Jane Hallman, Peg Parsons, and Sylvia Swede represented FPC. It was a time of fellowship, worship, and study.

The morning and evening plenaries were based on the theme "Lord, Make Me an Instrument of Your Peace" from the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi. Eighteen workshops were offered. Rev. Robert Keefer of the Church of the Master Presbyterian Church in Omaha spoke about "What God Taught Me Through Studying Evolution" and Danielle McKinney, the first Dakota woman ordained in the PCUSA, talked about Native American spirituality. Susan Dowd, PW Executive Director, told of the tremendous work PWs do through their Birthday Offering, the Thank Offering, Together in Service work, and Justice and Peace advocacy. Rahab's Rope, one of the recipients of a Thank Offering grant, is a Christian ministry that provides protection and education for children and women who have been trafficked in Mumbai, Bangalore, and Goa, India. Their goal is that every woman become completely self-sufficient.

Everyone is very excited about the 2016-17 Bible study, "Who is Jesus?" **Stephanie Anthony**, pastor of First Presbyterian in Hudson, WI, presented an overview of the study. The cards, totaling \$2305, went to the Center of Hope in Sioux Falls, a gospel outreach ministry for people who struggle with difficult life issues. The Friday night offering of \$3964 was divided between ECPAT-USA (End Child Prostitution and Trafficking), an international network that focuses on combating trafficking and the commercial sexual exploitation of children, and the Sweetgrass Program, which provides community awareness, support, resources, and skills for tribal youth suicide prevention on the Pine Ridge Reservation.


