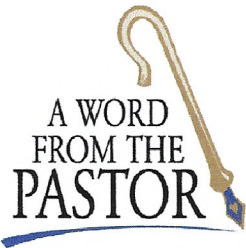

FPC:

A Four-for-Four church

I wonder how many of you know that First Presbyterian Church is a "Four for Four" church? No, this has nothing to do with the church's batting average! Four for Four

refers to our participation in all four special offerings that the PCUSA takes up each year. I thought I'd take a quick moment during the dog days of August to review what these offerings are and how they are used:

One Great Hour of Sharing

- 32% of the offering goes to restoring hope in communities recovering from disaster through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.
36% goes toward alleviating hunger through sustainable food systems and addressing the causes of poverty through the Presbyterian Hunger Program.
32% goes to Self-Development of People, which helps oppressed and disadvantaged communities.

Pentecost Offering

- 10% goes to Educate a Child national initiative.
25% goes to ministries with youth.
25% goes to the Young Adult Volunteer program.
40% of the offering is retained by local congregations for children, youth and young adult ministries (our Social Concerns committee distributes this each year)

Peace and Global Witness Offering

- 50% goes toward advocating for peacemaking and justice.
25% goes to support regional ministries of peace and reconciliation, through mid-council peace initiatives (Synods and Presbyteries).
25% is retained by local congregations for ministries of justice (our Social Concerns committee distributes this each year)

Christmas Joy Offering

- 50% of the offering helps provide financial support and funds grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers through the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions.
50% goes toward leadership development for people of color and education support at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color.

Last year, First Presbyterian Church gave a total of 26,477 dollars as a "Four for Four" church. I hope you feel good about the impact these gifts have on our community and the world. Thank you for continuing generosity as we seek to show God's love to the world!

Stewardship Alive!

Many ways to give

As a hen and a pig walked down the road, they noticed a church sign advertising a breakfast of "Ham and Eggs!"

"That's nice," said the hen. "A chance for us to serve the congregation."

"Easy for you to say," replied the pig. "For you, it's a contribution; for me, it's a sacrifice!"

Versions of this story appear on inspirational websites, with comments about the chicken being involved in breakfast, while the pig is committed. Opinions differ about which animal has the right idea. Some people warn against being the pig, sacrificing yourself for success; others say the chicken isn't all-in.

"People who give themselves to Jesus with a trusting abandon" are like pigs, says Rick Lawrence in The Jesus-Centered Life (Group). That total, "without reservation" commitment, he says, shows a willingness to give your life to Jesus — as he gave his for you.

On the other hand, giving consistently, day in and day out, even in what might seem to be small ways, also is valuable. Maybe the moral is not to judge others' stewardship because we all give differently.

Vacation Bible School at the Bdecan Church was a great success!



This year we added one day to our VBS program by having Vacation Bible School at the Activity Center in

Tokio, North Dakota on Tuesday. The Activity Center is on the reservation and about five miles from the Bdecan Church. The children from public housing at Tokio can walk the mile to the Activity Center, so a lot of them came. We had 33 children on Tuesday. Over half the children do not go to the Bdecan church and may not go to ANY church.

We were surprised to have high turnouts on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday as well when VBS was held at the Bdecan Church with 30 to 33 children each day. In past years we've had from 18 to 22 kids each day. 50 different kids came to at least one day of VBS. The children from public housing made up more than half the kids. Drivers were able to pack a lot of kids in their cars each day and offer rides!

The VBS team transported a family of four children (that we knew from previous years) to the church each day. The family had moved to Devils Lake last year and the children very

appreciative to be able to attend VBS again. They all said they love it at the Bdecan Church. The two oldest boys were very respectful and helpful during VBS and one helped Ron install carpet and shelves in the clothing pantry.

Ron led the building crew at the clothing pantry in preparing the subflooring, shoring up the paneling on the wall, blocking the gaps in the corners of the building and installing clothes racks and shelving. He was very busy, but took time to make friends with several of the littlest kids!

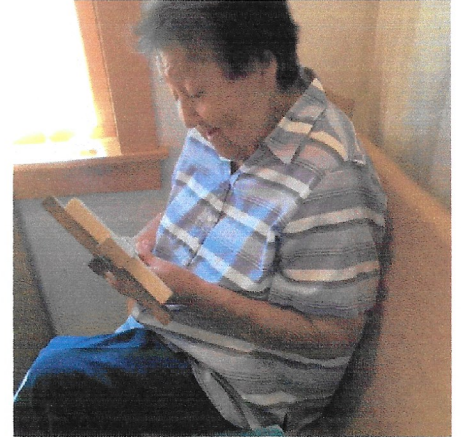
The children from public housing did not remember us from five years ago when we held VBS at the Activity Center and did not really connect

with us until Friday, which was a great day and included a treasure hunt! They all enjoyed the hunt and their treasure packet when they found all their clues. We modified our teaching techniques on Friday and that allowed us to



better help the little kids and better teach the older kids. (We had to deal with some behavior issues earlier in the week.)

Saturday we were supposed to have a fun walk to Wood Lake and lunch at the Bdecan Church with the church

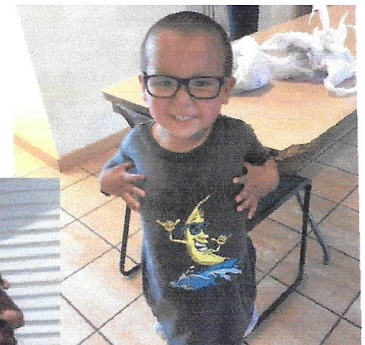


members, but there was a down pour and high winds, so we cancelled the walk and had the lunch at the Devils Lake Presbyterian Church. We were able to meet with the people from the Devils Lake Church, Northern Plains Bdecan Mission Committee members and also Bdecan church leaders (Hilda and Louie). We celebrated Joe Obermeyer's recent commissioning as a lay pastor at the Bdecan Presbyterian Church.

Sunday morning we worshipped with the Bdecan Presbyterian Church members and Joe gave a wonderful sermon and served Communion for the first time as a Commissioned Lay Pastor!

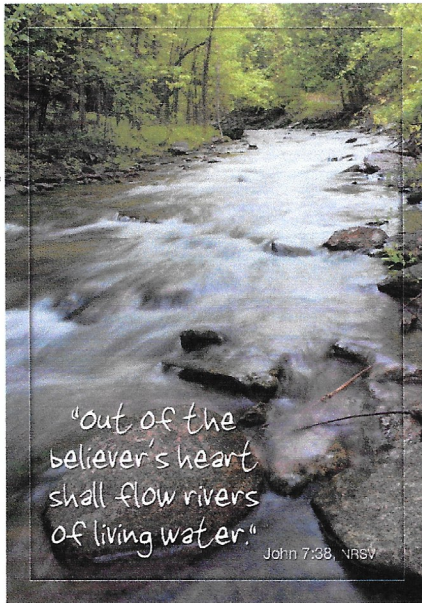

Synod Gathering of Presbyterian Women affirms PW Purpose



The Synod of Lakes and Prairies Gathering of Presbyterian Women was held in Ames, Iowa June 20-23. The Synod includes PCUSA churches in MN, IA, WI, NE, ND, and SD. Workshops and other activities affirmed the PW Purpose.

1. To nurture our faith through prayer and Bible study.

Plenaries in the morning and evening were based on the theme of the conference from John 7:38, "Out of the believer's heart shall flow streams of living water."

The PW Bible study for 2019-20 is "Love Carved in Stone: A Fresh Look at the Ten Commandments" written by Eugenia Anne Gamble. Using passages from both the New and Old Testaments, the author shows how the Ten Words are an invitation to a new relationship with God and others and how Jesus lived out these words.

2. To support the mission of the church worldwide.

Half of the Saturday offering of \$3867 went to Marion Medical Mission which provides a sustainable source of safe drinking water by building wells in Zambia, Malawi, and Tanzania. Since 1960, 35,000 wells have been built, each costing \$450.

Gift cards to Target or Hy-Vee, totaling \$3300, were given to Wings of Refuge, a Christian-based transition house for trafficked girls and the Butterfly Freedom House, a place designed to help women who have been incarcerated find hope and success after they have gotten out of prison.

A representative of Rahab's Rope, which helps people in the slums of Goa, India, emphasized how important the grants from the Thank Offering and the Birthday Offering have been in providing seed money for their work there.

The Hands-On Project during the conference provided 166 hygiene kits for girls who would otherwise miss school during their monthly periods. These will go to Sierra Leone.

3. To work for justice and peace.

2019 PW-supported Justice and Peace Initiatives include substance use disorders, global warnings and plastic pollution, violence against women, and immigration and refugees. Attendees were able to preview two documentaries produced by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, "Locked in a Box" about immigration detention, and "Flint: The Poisoning of an American City."

4. To build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church (USA) and witnesses to the promise of God's kingdom.

The Synod partners with the Dakota Presbytery, the Native American presbytery, and has a Native American Concerns Committee. We had workshops on The Circle of Life and Native American Stories to help us understand the culture of Native Americans.

The last Global Exchange was to Indonesia. An Arabic Presbyterian Church, with the assistance of churches in the Des Moines area, has been established under the leadership of Rev. Ekram Kachu. It is mainly a Sudanese congregation and has begun an Arabic Outreach Center. Half of the Saturday offering went to its Sudanese Tutoring Program.

The new moderator of the Synod is Sue Medsker-Nedderman, Hastings, Nebraska. Our representative on the national PW Coordinating Team is Marilyn Stone, Burlington, Wisconsin. The next Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women will be held in St. Louis August 5-8, 2021.

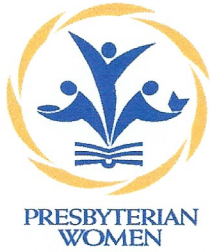
Willing Hearts and Able Hands

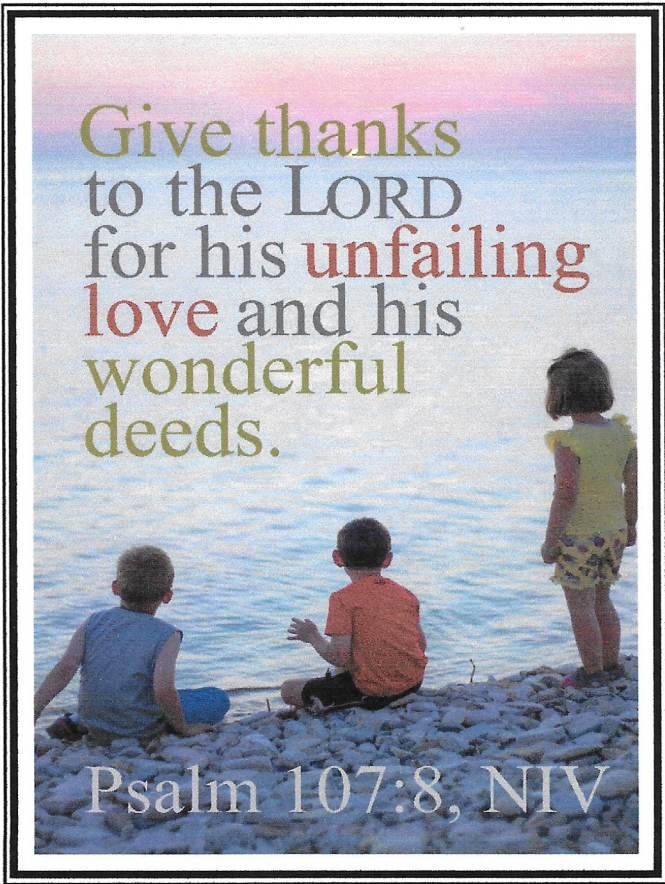

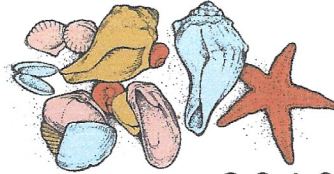
