It is not a time to enter into a period of excessive introspection, gloom, and self-denial. Instead, it is appropriate to use the season as an opportunity to take stock of our own lives. For many of us there are too few opportunities to slow down and reflect upon the direction of our hectic, consumerdriven existence. 

including Carnegie Hall in New York City, Orchestra Hall in Chicago, Grosser Saal of Konzerthaus in Vienna, Salle Gaveau and Salle Cortot in Paris, and both the Shanghai and Beijing Music Halls. The duo has also performed numerous concerts as part of Music Festivals in the Czech Republic.


Live performances have been broadcast by Minnesota Public Radio and Iowa Public Television. The duo has premiered and commissioned new works for the piano duo medium recording on the *Innova* label in the United States and the *Yangtze River* label in China.

Huang and Hu received their early training at the Shanghai Conservatory of Music, and later graduated from the University of Cincinnati's Conservatory of Music as students of Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff. Both hold a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where they studied with pianist Gilbert Kalish. They have served as Adjudicators for the Chicago Two-Piano Festival and Competition, Hong Kong Schools' Music Festival, Shanghai International Piano Festival and Institute, and have served as piano and chamber music faculty at Saarburg International Music Festival in Germany.

There is no admission fee for the concert but an offering will be accepted. A dessert reception will follow the concert.

The cost of hiding our light

A Los Angeles restaurant owner recently discovered that a neon light had been covered — without being disconnected first — during a construction project 77 years prior. The calculated electricity cost to run the hidden light all that time was \$17,000!

People don't intentionally hide light; that would be counterproductive, not to mention wasteful. Yet when we shrink back from sharing Jesus' good news, we do indeed hide "the light of the world" (Matthew 5:14) that is in us. When we're too modest to use God-given talents such as singing, playing piano or reading to bring others joy, we hide our light. When we put our own wants ahead of meeting someone else's needs through giving and serving, we hide the light of God's love. And at what cost?

"Let your light shine before others," Jesus says, "that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" (verse 16).

First Presbyterian Church celebrates 156th anniversary, recognizes 50⁺-year members



The First Presbyterian Church of Rochester was founded on February 17, 1861, by Sheldon Jackson. Since then we have traveled the roads of 156 years. Some of these roads have been rough, some smooth, some straight, some winding, but each one has helped reveal to us the love of God

working through our lives.

On February 19 we will honor and say "thank you" to 81 "golden" people who have been members for at least 50 years. Their names have been in our bulletins and newsletters as Sunday School teachers, ushers, choir members, stewardship campaign workers, elders, and deacons. Many of them still appear on the church's doorstep regularly as volunteers.

The Gray Sky Blues ~~~ ways to cope in February



Winter and spring are difficult times for Minnesotans' mental health.

The freezing temperatures, gray skies, and people's tendency to "hibernate" can make it a lonely and depressing time. Often it feels like spring will never come. In fact,

many people do have Seasonal Affective Disorder (appropriately labeled "SAD").

The reduced sunlight affects our brains and neurotransmitters such as serotonin and melatonin, resulting in irritability, sadness, oversleeping, food cravings, and other depression symptoms. What can we do to fight off the blues?

- 1. Consider talking to your doctor, especially if you are having thoughts of hurting yourself or if you are turning to alcohol or other destructive habits for relief. There are medications and light boxes that can help with these symptoms!
- Get sunlight however you can. Open your window, go for a walk, sit outside as long as you can, and do whatever possibly to make your space brighter.
- 3. **Exercise regularly** exercise makes almost everything better.
- 4. **Stay social** staying connected is more important than ever this time of year. It's easy to stay home by the fire, but make it a priority to seek out friends and family. They need the contact too!

And remember... the days are getting longer, so summer is on its way!

Session adopts \$787,687 budget

At its January meeting Session adopted a budget of \$787,687 for 2017. This is just under a 1% (\$6,513) decrease from the 2016 budget.

The budget will be underwritten by general budget pledges (\$601,935), outreach pledges (\$102,752), one-time gift (\$15,000), contributions over pledge (\$45,000), plate offering (\$13,000), miscellaneous income (\$8,500), and interest (\$1,500).

Committees were diligent in watching their budgets, and we ended 2016 with a balance of \$17,602 that will be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for extraordinary expenses or to cover years when we have a deficit.

Are you ready for the next installment of Synod School? Summer is just a few months away and the Synod of Lakes and Prairies is looking ahead to the last week in July — July 23-28 — when Synod School 2017 takes place at Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, Iowa. Theme for this year's event is "Let Justice Flow."

J. Herbert Nelson, recently elected stated clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), will be the convocation speaker, and Cláudio Carvalhaes, well-known speaker and worship leader, will lead evening worship.

Nelson, a noted speaker and preacher, and a strong force on issues of social justice, previously served as director of the PC(USA) Office of Public Witness in Washington, D.C.

Carvalhaes, a native of Brazil, joined the faculty of Union Theological Seminary in New York City last fall. He previously served on the faculty of Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Louisville (Ky.) Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago.

Synod School, an annual midsummer ministry of the Synod of Lakes and Prairies, is for laity, clergy, families, and singles. It is fun and mind-stretching courses, worship and singing you'll long remember, and times for both fellowship and private reflection.

Eighty classes for adults, as well as a full program for children and youth, provide great opportunities for learning, renewal and fun. Discover Synod School and you'll know why so many people keep returning.

"Boxtops for Education" provides school supplies for Kemmerer Village


