A Festival of Music showcases Luther College Nordic Choir

The 72-member Nordic Choir is Luther College's "flagship choir" and is one of the top a cappella college choirs in the nation.

The choir tours annually and has performed around the world appearing in Norway, England, Germany, Russia,

Poland, Hungary, Romania, the Baltic countries, Mexico and the Caribbean. They have appeared throughout the United States in such well-known concert halls as Lincoln Center in New York and the Kennedy Center in Washington, D. C. Highlights of 2015 included a tour of Italy and a performance of Handel's *Messiah* at Orchestra Hall in Minneapolis.

Traditions within the Nordic Choir include holding hands during all performances, sapphire blue velvet robes, and singing Pavel Chesnokov's *O Lord God* as their signature benedictory since 1948. They will be joining us as they return to the Midwest after their West Coast Tour (13 concerts in 14 days).


Allen Hightower, director of choral activities and professor of music at Luther, is the conductor of the Nordic Choir. He gives leadership to a choral program that includes four conductors, six choirs, and over 500 singers. He presently serves as a Worship Pastor at Autumn Ridge Church in Rochester. Luther College, home to one of the largest collegiate music programs in the world, also involves another 500 student musicians in three bands, three orchestras, two jazz bands and numerous


chamber ensembles.

Dear Elders, Staff and Members of First Presbyterian Church,

Warm Christmas greetings from South Sudan! And yes, it is really very warm here as the dry season is upon us.

When our family first moved to South Sudan in December of 2011, we heard news about a large attack on a rural community which brought many displaced persons and orphaned children to Juba, South Sudan's capital city. Some of the people who fled their homes, and children who lost their parents, resettled in the community near Akatgol Presbyterian Church in Juba.

When this South Sudanese Presbyterian church saw that the displaced children were not able to pay fees to attend government schools, God moved them to open a free school, Akatgol Primary School. The church collected offerings during Sunday worship, asked the older youth in the choir to serve as volunteer teachers, and made classrooms of sticks and mud. The children were very grateful.

This year, through the South Sudan Education and Peacebuilding Project, the PCUSA added two cement classrooms to the Akatgol School. The church members, children, and community are encouraged by this partnership.

"People look at the new building, and they are amazed," explained the head teacher, "But I tell them, with God, nothing is impossible."

We are so grateful that, through the PCUSA, we are able to join with the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan as they serve God through serving the local community. Our family feels humbled by the opportunity to be in South Sudan, and we know that we cannot do so on our own. Thank you for your support of our family and of the ministries of peacebuilding and education we feel called to serve. Your prayers and financial support encourages us.

Thank you, First Presbyterian Church family, for your generous gift of \$2,500 this year. Our family is humbled by your partnership and also incredibly grateful for the opportunity to have you join us in God's work in South Sudan.

As Christmas approaches, the people of South Sudan continue to pray that peace will hold in their country. Many fear that violent conflict will continue. Living in South Sudan has given me a deep appreciation of the Christmas promise that someday there will be peace on earth. God places that longing in

the human heart, and Christ's birth gives that hope life.

Grateful for your participation in God's work on earth and for your shared hope in the promise of peace, thank you!

How to keep your New Year resolutions



It's January again - time to make New Year resolutions you won't keep, perhaps start a diet you won't stick to or join a gym you won't use... Just kidding! Here are some ways to keep those New Year's resolutions this year.

#1 Be Realistic

Almost nobody can go from zero minutes of exercise a day to an hour or safely and healthily lose 50 pounds in a month. Pick a goal that is realistic.

#2 Be Specific

You should still pick a specific goal. Saying "I want to spend more time reading the Bible" will be less motivating and more difficult to measure then saying "I want to spent 30 minutes every day reading the Bible."

#3 Have a plan

Make a multistep plan for how you're going to achieve your goal. For example, if your goal is to lose 30 pounds through diet and exercise, one step might be to join the gym, the second to meet with an exercise professional and nutritionist and develop a plan, and the third to work towards your weight loss goal.

#4 Get help

Accountability is very important in attaining goals. Find an accountability partner, or someone to help you with your goal! Other people probably want to achieve the same goal you do. Don't be afraid to ask for help at work, at church, or on social media. Doing things together makes them more fun too!

#5 Start on Monday

For whatever reason, research shows that people who start a resolution on a Monday have more success. Perhaps it's the start of a new week. So maybe this year you should have fun the weekend after New Year's and start your resolutions on Monday!

Budget needs estimated at \$800,000; available funds reach \$761,152

Thank you for your response to our pledge campaign for 2016. Your responses have been supportive and we appreciate it. We just need more responses returned.

Including both general and outreach budgets, as of December 17 we had \$761,152 (including pledged and non-pledged income) committed for 2016. To fund committees' current budgets and

allow for some growth we need about \$800,000, leaving us a gap of about \$39,000..

Per Capita assessed at \$32.87 per member for 2016

As local church members, we have an obligation to support our higher judicatories. This per capita assessment supports overhead expenses of our church, including presbytery, synod, and general assembly.

The amount due each judicatory is set at the particular unit's meeting during the summer and is based on membership on December 31 of the previous year. Our membership on December 31, 2014 was 744. The assessment per active member includes \$20.60 for presbytery, \$5.25 for synod, and \$7.02 for general assembly.

Even if you choose to not pledge, we urge you to consider making a donation of at least \$32.87 per member to help us underwrite this budget item of \$24,455.28. Thank you!

We will mail final statements for 2015 about January 7. The statement format will list each eligible charitable contribution made to First Presbyterian during 2015. For those who itemize deductions on their income tax return, this format meets the IRS requirement for substantiation of contributions.

Pick up your pledge envelopes

Please pick up your pledge envelopes in the social hall by January 31. Envelopes are prepared for adults who contribute regularly (unless you told us you don't want envelopes or you use ACH), for new members, and for children (pre-kindergarten through senior high) who want them.

Because many of you don't use offering envelopes, we've cut down the number we order. If we inadvertently left your name off the envelope list, please let us know. It's actually more cost efficient for us if you use envelopes.

If there isn't a box with your name and you would like one, if you've never used envelopes and you'd like to, or if your children would like a box, we have extras and would be happy to give you one.

Whenever canceling is a possibility, please check these sources for up-to-date information.

In this winter season when conditions can create slippery walkways, the Buildings & Grounds Committee asks all members be responsible and wear appropriate footwear made for snow and ice and choose the safest path from your car into the building. FPC Facility Manager Harry Coleman did a great job last season keeping the church walks as clear of snow/ice as possible, but each of us must also do our part for safety by exercising caution and discretion. 
