


PASTOR'S QUILL

Nancy Guthrie writes, "Sometimes what causes us the most pain and confusion is not what God says to us but the fact that in the midst of difficulty, God seems to say nothing at all."

God's silence. Certainly a major theme in the Book of Job. In his misery, Job dared to question God about the silence in the face of his prayers.

The silence of God has been explored by many novelists, playwrights, and theologians – and by most people who have gone through tough times. We may not eloquently articulate our questions, but they still boil deep within us. The answers we receive can feel inadequate to provide comfort or to genuinely explain what weighs on us and bewilders us. We long to know why devastating things happen to us. Like Job, we long for understanding so we can bear the pain.

Did God answer Job? Yes – but with more questions and a long, dramatic monologue describing birds, beasts, mountains, and storms – all the wonders of creation. Where was Job when God made all this?

"God doesn't explain," Guthrie writes. "Instead, God reveals the Divine Presence and in the midst of this awesome presence, Job's questions are not answered – they simply disappear."

Magnificence and mystery – those are the two "answers" the Book of Job reveals to us. We find much wisdom, guidance and truth in God's Word. But we also find a lot of mystery as well. Our minds cannot even frame the right questions.

We'll never solve all the mysteries, but we know all that happens is weighted down with significance. As Guthrie writes, "Job had no idea he was a player in a cosmic confrontation." He had no idea his faithfulness in extreme difficulty mattered so much. But it did."

It does for us as well, as we worship God and pray that God will keep us faithful in these trying pandemic times. Each follower of God is a key player in this magnificent mystery.

For me, no season offers more magnificence than autumn. The colors, the smells, the taste of the air – all of it reveals the glory of God.

So I pray that you will enjoy my favorite season, and I hope to see you at one (or all!) of the events highlighted in this Newsletter.

Every year on the Sunday closest to All Saints Day, November 1st, we take time as a church during worship to remember and honor those who have died since the previous All Saints Sunday. This year that Sunday will be October 31—which is also Reformation Sunday. Traditionally we share a brief liturgy and prayer, then the name of each church member who died since last November 1 is spoken aloud as a candle is lighted in loving remembrance. But this year it feels appropriate to add another dimension to the observance. This year we will also remember our beloved members who died during the shutdown/quarantine period which began in the spring of 2020. This unprecedented situation created an added burden for every grieving person in our congregation. The loss of many Christian rituals, processes and ceremonies which are relied upon before, during and after death is a significant loss. Although most had at least a brief burial service or placement of ashes attended by immediate family, some did not, and for all it was a severe departure from the norm. This added to the grief of the people closest to those who died in ways that still may not be fully absorbed. And so on Sunday, October 31, we will take a moment during worship, as part of our annual Memorial/All Saints Sunday litany to include those who died during the worst of the pandemic. We simply must acknowledge the painful complications the pandemic inflicted upon every surviving spouse and family member who are grieving, as well as our congregation as a whole. In doing so we affirm our faith in the communion of saints, the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting, as articulated in the Apostles' Creed.

Civil Rights leader, Rabbi, professor of Jewish Mysticism, and Jewish theologian/philosopher Abraham Joshua Heschel (1907-1972) wrote a little book on the meaning of the Sabbath. I keep it nearby and read from it often. As the seasons are changing, I am looking ahead at the enticing musical opportunities that now populate the calendar. I maintain an eagerness for the rewarding fellowship and community building available to us all at FPC. So, I was reminded to return to this handbook on time yet again.

Heschel writes, "Time is the presence of God in the world of space, and it is within time that we are able to sense the unity of all beings." Later the Rabbi offers a handy musical metaphor: "Creation is the language of God, Time is God's song, and things of space the consonants in the song. To sanctify time is to sing the vowels in unison with God. This is [our] task: to conquer space and sanctify time."

Covid-19 awareness (with realistic acknowledgment), precaution, vigilant skepticism, are all still very important. This I feel strongly as ever, and I work to accept this each new day.

I am led, however, to ask a question. How are you balancing your focus when it comes to temporary things and things of the Spirit, which are of God and of time? We don't own time and we all get the same amount to make due with. God is present today as ever and is actively continuing the work begun at creation. How are you participating in this present, yet, eternal pursuit?

I'd like to draw your attention to ongoing and upcoming ministry offerings that I hope may hold an element of Sabbath for you. Perhaps your participation in these opportunities will enrich your Spirit for YOUR sake and help you sanctify your measure of time. Good! Perhaps your participation in these opportunities will translate to an act of love or strengthened bond THROUGH you, in community. The subtle benefits of a Christian way of life are easy to imagine (and overlook) and are difficult to commit to.

The Ergonomics of Electronics

Many jobs and activities these days revolve around electronic devices like computers, phones and tablets rather than dangerous machinery or rampaging livestock. Yet the potential for injury is still present! Carpal tunnel and "cell phone elbow" have flourished. Office setting back pain is common. How can we work and play safely?

- Watch your posture even when you watch TV. Keep your back straight, neck neutral and shoulders back and down. Consider using a backrest to promote natural spine curvature. Keep wrists straight when using keyboard and phone. Don't cradle your phone between shoulder and ear.
- Make sure your back is supported and legs are at 90 degrees with feet on the ground. Don't sit cross legged or off balance to avoid nerve compression.
- 3) Switch it up! Use a sit/stand desk if possible. Use voice dictation for your phone or Bluetooth in the car to make calls. Alternate using fingers and thumb to text. Use a headset for calls at work
- 4) Take breaks and stretch. Do stretches of arms and fingers one minute for every 30 minutes of electronic activity. Go old school and walk to a colleague if possible rather then send a message. Walk around between episodes.
- 5) For eyestrain remember 20-20-20. Your computer screen should be at least 20 inches away and for every 20 minutes of computer work, glance away for 20 seconds. For every 2 hours, rest eyes from computer work for 15 minutes. Keep the top of your computer monitor at eye level or just below.

If your body is warning you with pain, listen. Maybe you need a break, maybe you need to change what you're doing, but ignoring soreness now can lead to more problems later!
