Francois Fenelon was a French Archbishop who was a theologian and writer in the early 1700's. He asks the question, "Do you wonder why God has to make it so hard on you? Why doesn't God make you good without making you so miserable in the meantime?"

Fenelon brings us some comfort and insight when he writes, "I am awed by what suffering can produce. #### A Festival of Music welcomes the ANCIA Saxophone Quartet

Celebrated for its artistry, virtuosity, and exquisitely blended sound, the ANCIA Saxophone Quartet has delighted audiences throughout North America, Europe, and Asia. ANCIA (pronounced *AHN-chee-uh*) was founded in 1990 and has been joyfully transporting audiences across time and genre, performing repertoire that spans centuries and musical styles, including Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, 20th Century, contemporary, jazz, popular, and music from a broad range of world cultures. Dedicated to the creation and performance of new works for saxophone quartet, ANCIA works in collaboration with composers to premiere, perform, and record the music of our time.

Individually, ANCIA members are active soloists, chamber musicians, and professional saxophonists in a broad range of musical genres, including work in classical chamber, orchestral, jazz, national touring Broadway productions, and contemporary popular idioms. ANCIA members hold degrees from Eastman School of Music, Indiana University, Ithaca College, New England Conservatory of Music, Northwestern University, and St. Olaf College. As dedicated teachers, ANCIA members serve as saxophone artistteachers at Augsburg College, University of Minnesota, University of Wisconsin-River Falls, and University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, and have presented masterclasses, workshops, and educational performances worldwide.

Three programs are supported by One Great Hour of Sharing: **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance**, the **Presbyterian Hunger Program**, and **Self-Development of People**. All work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope. Each gift to One Great Hour of Sharing supports efforts to relieve hunger ( the Presbyterian Hunger Program), promote development (through the Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People), and assist in restoring areas affected by disaster (through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.) Projects in economically poor communities in the United States and around the world have the opportunity to develop solutions to their own challenges.

As Jesus says in Matthew 25, the Church belongs with those in need — with those suffering from natural and human-caused disasters; with those lacking access to food, water and healthcare; and with those struggling for justice, righteousness, and peace. Through our gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, we are there because we are the Church, together.

#### April is Autism Awareness Month

Chances are your life has been touched by someone with autism. About one in 68 children has autism, which is more common than childhood cancer, diabetes and AIDS combined! Autism often occurs with other health struggles, particularly seizure disorders. Autistic individuals can care deeply but have trouble developing empathetic and socially connective behavior. They have a wide range of functioning, just as neurotypical individuals do – some never speak or become independent, while others have geniuslevel intelligence or develop excellent social skills. How can we support those with autism and their caregivers?

- 1. Remember that everyone is made in the image of God, whether on or off the autism spectrum. Everyone has strengths, weaknesses and purpose.
- 2. Support those with autism and their caregivers with love, respect, and empathetic listening.
- 3. When interacting with those with autism, remember the fruit of the spirit particularly patience, kindness, and self control. Even high functioning people with autism may do repetitive actions or not understand social cues or sarcasm, and these behaviors are not deliberate.
- 4. Consider supporting autism research and activities. Did you know autism spectrum disorder costs a family \$60,000 on average? Earlier intervention is better for children and families.
- 5. Remember we can always cover friends and families affected by autism with loving prayer.



Three books with FPC connections have been added to the library!

We received a complimentary copy of *TODAY BELONGS TO YOU* written by the Reverend Donald D. McCall, who served as our lead pastor for about twenty years in the 60s and 70s. While in Rochester he had a brief TV fling with a 30-second inspirational wake-up message during a break in the early morning *Today Show*. Many of these vignettes are published with the religious inspiration McCall drew from his world travels. He dedicates the book to our congregation.

Many of you remember Carol Christensen and her husband, Lee, who were long-time FPC members. After Carol's death in 2012 and before Lee's death in 2016, Lee turned her memoir-notes over to Jim Martin (Lonnie's son and Carol's cousin) who organized the notes with family photos in an enjoyable read about her family, including Carol's brief service as a nurse in New Guinea during WWII.

FPC members who participated in work trips to Sheldon Jackson College in Sitka, Alaska, may remember Marcel LaPerriere, who headed the college's maintenance department and worked closely with our work crews. His struggle of several years with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) is the main focus of his book, but those who worked with him may be reminded of an enjoyable experience. In a hand-written note in the front of the book, he thanks FPC workers for giving him pleasant memories.
