

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We are Excited to be Coming Back!

I am happy to report that at our March meeting, the session targeted Sunday, June 13th as the date to resume "in-person" worship with some restrictions. Here are the details for how we plan to worship together for at least this summer (because, who knows, things might change by the time this newsletter even gets to you).



...........

Before Sunday:

Make a reservation using Signup Genius on the church website. We plan to seat up to approximately 85 people between the sanctuary and the social hall. We will ask for your email address and a phone number to assist with contact tracing. For groups of more than two, you might want to consider sitting in the social hall since we have more flexibility for seating options there. The multipurpose room will also be available for families with children who need to move around during the service.

Before coming to church:

Do a self-assessment of your own health and the health of your family members. If you feel sick in any way, please stay home.

Upon arrival:

Enter the building using the Atrium doors only.

Masks will be required; sanitize your hands.

Maintain social distancing of 6 feet.

Confirm your reservation at the welcome desk.

There will be baskets set-up near the welcome desk to leave an offering and make prayer requests.

Proceed to the sanctuary or the social hall.

Bulletins will be left by the doors for you to take.

The pews will be marked with tape with "x's" marking the seating areas.

During the service:

We will not be singing.

The children will remain in their seats for Children's Time.

We can do baptisms with no contact, as you have seen in our digital services. When we celebrate communion, we will use pre-made, sealed packets of wafers and juice that will be consecrated during the service and taken home afterwards.

After the service:

Ushers will dismiss pews individually. Please exit the building through the Atrium doors, making sure to keep proper social distance, and sanitize your hands on the way out.

For those who are not ready to worship in person just yet:

We will livestream the service on our YouTube channel.

You can also park in the parking lot and tune in to FM 88.5 and listen to the service from your car.

I hope that this will only be necessary for our summer worship. I pray that we can go back to our normal routine in the fall, after the Labor Day weekend. The session will re-visit the situation as things develop. But for the summer, we appreciate your cooperation and your prayers as we strive to keep everyone as healthy and safe as we can.

The Good News

of First Presbyterian Church

On the day I write this in April, the temperature is 37 degrees. The wind clocks in at whatever-puts-a-depth-charge-chill into me. Sun lost behind gray-layered clouds. I don't like to complain about the weather and I wouldn't do it here if it didn't affect me the way it does from time to time. Certain kinds of days at certain times of year bring me down. Like the cloudy, windy, down-right-cruel 37-degree April day a few days removed from a radical 70-degree April day. Nevermind the magnolias' glory leading the way. Nevermind the various apple trees holding their breath-blossoms. Nevermind the trees have shed their bud-shells. Nevermind those two (or three) random warm, lovely April days were so immediately invigorating, so filled with life-force and life-spirit, sights and feelings. All that did was leave me petulant today.

But that's how April goes up in these here parts. *True Spring* rarely, if ever, arrives on time; at least not on my timeline. It answers to other, more powerful, age-old, deeply-hidden forces. And so, we wait. Our anticipation creates its own kinetic energy, ready & waiting to ... spring.

April's antics have me thinking about our Black sisters and brothers. They who anticipate spring as in *Justice*. For generations. We don't know what that's like. Not really. Only the metaphor of April in Minnesota comes close, with its tantalizing promises. Led by the glorious April day dropping in to remind us why we live here--why we put up with winter-until it suddenly disappears leaving us wondering, how much longer will it take?! April blossoms longing to open and stretch toward the warming sun are forced to wait, vulnerable to getting crushed under foot (or knee) while waiting. Perhaps the closest we get is the glorious April day when all creation is bursting to Spring only to be hushed by the lingering cold front. To make ourselves feel better while enduring the delay, we're adept at shifting perspective ("it's not that bad") or offering explanation ("well, it's because of ____").

Where the metaphor fails, the anguish speaks volumes. If it is your son, your brother, your husband, your uncle, your father; your daughter, your sister, your wife, your mother; your neighbor down the street, your friend from church or school who suddenly dies a preventable death, then you would feel differently. This current anguish and trauma has been going on not merely for years but for GENERATIONS. Until we see or feel what we haven't seen or felt, only then can the truth about race in America pierce our white veil or shine like the bold, elusive, warm April sun. Otherwise, it remains in the realm of metaphor. Yet all creation

moves with longing for the day when you and I join the May Day procession marching in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ to reveal God's vision for God's

suffering beloved.

Introducing Beth Stuebing and Ben Adams, Nancy Boutelle

Introducing Dr. Beth Stuebing, a trauma surgeon, her husband, Ben Adams, a psychotherapist, and their three young children. Going to the mission field has been a goal for Beth and Ben since before they met. It has been amazing to see how God has been putting together the pieces for years in finding the perfect fit for their gifts and skills in Malawi.

Board certified in surgery and intensive care medicine, Beth will be joining a medical team establishing a new surgical residency at Nkhoma Presbyterian Mission Hospital in central Malawi. The residency will formally train young Malawian physicians to become certified surgeons. After graduating from the 5-year program, these surgeons will be placed at the various Presbyterian mission hospitals in Malawi that currently have no surgeons at all. Ben is a psychotherapist who specializes in treating patients who have experienced trauma. Beth and Ben will be instrumental as part of a larger plan to equip the Presbyterian Church to create an innovative national

healthcare network.

Malawi is a country in Southeast Africa about the size of Pennsylvania. It is the third poorest country in the world. The capital city of Lilongwe has a population of 1.1 million people.

Please keep Beth, Ben, and their family in your prayers. We will share information with all of you as it evolves.

UPDATE:Bdecan Presbyterian Church Ministry Team, Marylynn Aalderks

The FPC Bdecan Ministry Team had been hoping to make a trip to the Bdecan Presbyterian Church in Tokio, North Dakota, to provide a threeday vacation bible school in July of this year; however, the COVID situation is still very uncertain.

The Bdecan planning committee has been meeting and we have decided just to send the planning committee (Marylynn Aalderks, Jane Hallman, Cindy Kunzman and Vicki Wintheiser) over a weekend in September to provide a fun weekend church experience for the children

of the church and to continue the relationship between First Presbyterian Church members and the members of the Bdecan Church. We fully anticipate that we will be able to send a full mission team to the Bdecan Church in 2022 and to provide a four day VBS program.

In addition, Larry Boutelle, a retired Presbyterian Pastor, will be going to the Bdecan Church to preach a sermon, provide communion and baptize any new babies in August.

Many of the adult members of the Bdecan Church have been hit hard by COVID, but they are recovering. COVID vaccines are available to them at the Fort Totten Health Service and vaccinations have been going well.

A more recent problem on the reservation has been wildfires with four fires very near the Bdecan Church. The church remains safe and none of the church members' homes have been reported damaged by the fires.

Bdecan Messages of Hope

Elsewhere in this newsletter, you can read about the Bdecan Mission Team's plan to visit this fall. Not only are we seeking to build our relationship with the children of Bdecan by providing a shortened vacation bible school, we also are planning a project to demonstrate our support of the

Bdecan women (the grandmas, aunties and mothers) by dedicating time on the Sunday afternoon to the women.

We are asking the women of FPC to create a book, "*Messages of Hope*," that compiles poetry and prose and will be presented to the Bdecan women. We will intersperse blank pages among your submissions so that each recipient can also journal, draw or create their own art among our messages.

We hope YOU will join us in providing entries for the book plus art work for the covers. The books will be 6 X 9 inches with $5\frac{1}{2} X 8\frac{1}{2}$ inch pages. Content can be original or shared – just be certain to credit the source – and should fit onto one page. Topic ideas include family, friendship, nature, love, and hope. Page submissions will be duplicated so that each book contains the same material.

Books will each contain an original artwork cover created on kraft cardstock paper. Cover stock can be picked up in the church office. If you feel particularly creative, please consider contributing more than one. We plan to make 15-20 books.

We hope you are as excited about this project as we are and will use this opportunity to share your time and talent and spread some hope. Please submit your contributions by June 15. A Reflection on Hope

"Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers." (Romans 12: 12-13)

"*Rejoice in Hope*" was the theme chosen for the Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women, which had to be cancelled in February because of the pandemic. What follows is a reflection on HOPE written by Sharon Falck, PW moderator of the Des Moines Presbytery.

I find if I open my Bible, read God's word and want to discern what it says to me at that moment, it is comforting and gives me hope. It seems there is always a message that is appropriate to my needs and the needs of my family, my church, my community and the world.

According to the concordance in my Bible, there are 34 references to hope in the Scriptures, with Romans and Psalms having the most. A few of my favorites are:

- Psalm 130:5"I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I put my hope."
- Psalm 147:11"The Lord delights in those who fear him, who put hope in his unfailing love."

Romans 8:24-25"In this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all, for who hopes for what he already sees? But if we hope for what we do not see. we wait for it patiently."

Take time to search the Scriptures for hope and believe them. Another way to look at HOPE is to look at each letter separately so you can see another picture of what God has in store for you as you think about HOPE. In doing this you may think:

H = honesty, healing, health;

- O = <u>openness</u>, <u>others</u>, <u>opportunity</u>;
- P = persistence, prayer, peace;
- E = gyes to see the world through God's eyes and gars to hear God's messages.

It did the Stender family much good to interact with people at the recent donut social hosted by the Welcoming and Nurturing committee. Thank you for this inter-generational festivity! That's something we have missed the most throughout this past year in exile. Especially, Daniel, who has grown up attending every kind of worship and church event, thrives on visiting with folks, and he loves the church environment.

That's one reason I got to thinking back in October of last year that we needed to create some sort of inter-generational connection that we could still enjoy in spite of COVID-19 restrictions. It has been so lovely to receive occasional messages and cards filled with love and happy wishes from Sitter Service volunteers. That got me thinking, too ...

... So, I'm glad to present a project that has been in the works for a long time. This began last fall, I forgot about it several times,

came back to it a few times, and book publishers kept extending their 'read-aloud copyright permissions plans.' Now I've finally finished the editing and posting process.

With the help of many caring individuals, we have created a collection of 17 videos that we're calling *Sitter Service Reads*! The volunteer readers chose some of their favorite children's books, found new ones, and took time to imagine how they'd like to relate them to their own grand- and great-grandchildren as well as the people of FPC.

Having been the only person in the room besides each reader, I can attest that my emotions ran high while these stories were lovingly shared. Some of the books are just plain fun and silly, most of them have wonderfully deep and even challenging morals to impart, all of them teach something

valuable. Some are sad at times, some are happy, some are dreamy and imaginative.
