Ken Aalderks, Social Concerns

Maybe not everyone reads "Hints From Heloise" in the Rochester Post Bulletin, and I consider myself one who does not read her column, but the headline caught my attention. It is related to the topic of the Social Concerns Committee next FORUM@FIRST. Heloise's column title was "Keep financial info private to avoid ID theft." She makes the following points, some of which I have summarized:

- Go over your monthly bills and statements very carefully. You may find purchases you didn't make. Contact your credit card company or bank and notify them that the charges are not yours.
- Never, ever, give out your Social Security number to anyone who calls you on the phone. Same goes for your PIN numbers or passwords.
- If you do online banking, change your password at least twice a year and use strong passcodes that won't be easily guessed by scammers.
- Pick up checks or checkbooks at the bank. Never have them mailed to your house because they could easily be mailed to the wrong address.
 - You don't need to tell anyone about your finances.
 - As I mentioned in last week's bulletin insert, never tell anyone how much you have saved, have invested in or what is your worth.
 - If you receive an email from someone who claims to be from a credit card company or a bill collector, and they provide you with a specific phone number or website to contact them at, don't use it. Instead, find their website by researching their name and get the phone number directly from the website.

As you heard Holly describe her frightening and frustrating experiences this past Sunday at church services, we can all benefit from the following advice: If you get a letter or phone call from someone who claims you didn't pay off your credit card, claims they're from a credit card (or any company) you've never heard of, or claims they are collecting money for a debt, challenge them to show proof. Chances are they're just scammers trying to steal from you.
