

April 2017

Back in 2006, comedian Stephen Colbert invented a word that eventually found its way into our cultural lexicon. Perhaps you remember the term "truthiness." Eleven years ago it won the distinction of "Word of the Year." Colbert has defined truthiness as

"believing something that feels true, even if it isn't supported by fact."

Both Dictionary.com and The Urban Dictionary add a different shade of meaning to their definitions. Both include a nod to the idea that truthiness involves believing something based not on fact or evidence, but on one's own intuition, opinion or perception. Truthiness comes about when we believe something based on what we wish to be true, rather than what the evidence will support.

I've been thinking a bit about truthiness over the last couple of weeks. Perhaps you've noticed that major news outlets, such as CNN, seem to coin a new phrase every day to describe how our political leaders present issues to the country. I've heard phrases such as "alternative facts" (which I suppose lead to alternative truth), "counterfactual," "reality distortion" and "evidence-free claim." And of course, we've all become familiar with the term "fake news." All of this leaves me wondering where to turn when we look for what is true.


In July 2016, Katharine Viner wrote an article in The Guardian called "How technology disrupted the truth." In that article she wrote, "What is common to these struggles between truth and falsehood, fact and rumor – and what makes their resolution an urgent matter – is that they all involve the diminishing status of truth. It simply means that we cannot agree on what those truths are, and when there is no consensus about the truth and no way to achieve it, chaos soon follows. Interestingly, what counts as a fact is merely a view that someone feels to be true – and technology has made it very easy for these 'facts' to circulate with a speed and reach that was unimaginable even a decade ago."

It seems that truthiness, which started as satire, has become a reality of everyday life.

We are nearing the celebration of our Holy Week, culminating in Easter Sunday. This is the season in which we celebrate some truths that we hold dear. Our Christian truth is that God loves and values each of us. God loves us so much, that God gave up the Son for us. Jesus, God's Son, came to show us how to live life as God wants us to live — even if it means going against the powers that be in this world, even to the point of death. And the greatest truth of all is this. Ultimately God is in control! Not even death has the final word. God always triumphs. And that, my friends, is not "fake news." That is Good News!

By the way – don't be too surprised to hear some of this come Easter Sunday.

Health care mission trip offers opportunity extraordinary

When your mind wanders to "faraway places" or you think a new experience would be a very good challenge, you may have been stymied by the lack of a good opportunity. There is now such an opportunity.

The Medical Benevolence Foundation (MBF), a mission component of PCUSA, is organizing a health care team to go to Haiti, where the group will be working in Leogane. Dr. Rudy Roth is the leader and has led teams there four times. The dates for this year's trip are October 7-14.

The base will be Hôpital Sainte Croix. This hospital is supported by MBF and is a major provider of health care in this part of Haiti. The hospital is also the site where the nearby Nursing School, also supported by MBF, does their clinical training. It is the only BSN School in Haiti.

Dr. Roth indicated to me that Pediatrics, Internal Medicine and Family Medicine specialties and nurses "work best." There is also need for an Ophthalmologist. He also said that "but I have found that God provides whoever He will and we watch Him work." MBF wants to create a maternal child center so a Neonatologist, OBGYN, and perhaps labor and delivery nurses would be very helpful.

Dr. Roth indicated that the team will "likely go two days to schools in the country and do school physicals." At the hospital, team members can be matched with Haitian counterparts.

From personal experience this type of experience is both educational, enriching and, at times challenging. Spiritual fitness takes front and center in April

Physical, social, and emotional wellness are not the only predictors of our health. Spiritual health plays an important role too. A 2016 study showed that church attendance lowered risk of death by 33% in those who went more than once per

week. Whoever is reading this article is in some way involved with church... but are we keeping "spiritually fit"?

- 1) **Spiritual diet** It's important to look at what we are taking in. We are what we read! Are we learning at both church/Bible study and at home? Are we praying and listening to God?
- 2) **Spiritual exercise** Are we practicing our beliefs? Are we "running the race"? Although we are saved by grace, works and service are the fruit of our faith.
- 3) **Spiritual fellowship** Are we connecting with other believers? We call it the church body for a reason we work together and support and love each other. Whatever our gifts are, there is a place for us and there are people to love and mentor us, and people who need our help.

Every believer is different but we definitely have one thing in common - Jesus! As our great festival of Easter comes, let us continue to pursue spiritual fitness the way we strive for physical, mental and social fitness.

For example, Ged King, a barber in England, devotes some of his time off to giving homeless people free haircuts. Imagine Jesus saying, "For my hair was long and scraggly, and you cut it" — or "My heart was lonely, and you played music to lift my spirits. I could no longer read small print, and you read to me. I have to work two jobs, and you invited my child to spend afternoons crafting with you. My car broke down, and you repaired it." Then the King will say, ... "Come, you who are blessed by my Father ... whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me" (based on Matthew 25:34, 40, NIV)

church beginning Monday, May 8.


Note that we cannot accept computers, microwaves, TVs or large exercise equipment.
