Five verses for a pandemic

The coronavirus has taken over the news, our plans, our communications, and our schedules. As we work in a new reality of social distancing, what does the Bible tell us?

1. "What has been is what will be, and what has been done is what will be done; and there is nothing new under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 1:9 RSV)

While this is the first pandemic many of us have known, epidemics have flourished from the Plagues of Egypt to the Black Death and the Spanish flu.

2. "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; ...

a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing..." (Ecclesiastes $3:1-2, 5 \,\,\mathrm{RSV})$

This season of distance and separation too shall pass.

3. "Thus says the Lord of hosts, Render true judgments, show kindness and mercy each to his brother, do not oppress the widow, the fatherless, the sojourner, or the poor; and let none of you devise evil against his brother in your heart." (Zechariah 7:9-10 RSV)

How easily xenophobia and fear of others flourish in these times. Our natural reaction is to draw away (and certainly it is a time to be careful!) Yet let us not forget those who are most affected in times of sickness and recession - those struggling to make ends meet. May our hands be sanitized and open!

4. "For he will deliver you from the snare of the fowler and from the deadly pestilence;" (Psalms 91:3 RSV)

Our God is far mightier than any opposition we face, whether human or viral.

5. "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." (John 14:27 RSV)

Our anxieties often take over in normal circumstances, much more in this time of trouble and change! Only God's peace can give us calm in the storm. No matter what, He will be with you.

Ways you can \$upport the church

Please remember that even though we aren't having services, we still have bills to pay. There are several ways you can help us:

- 1. Mail your check to the church or bring your check or cash to the church office.
 - 2. Use your own bank's online bill pay to send a payment to the church.
- 3. Give electronically through Vanco (Giveplus app). Go to the church's WEB page. Scroll to the bottom and click on 'donate' in the left column. You'll get a red button with DONATE on it. Click and you'll get to the donation page. You will have to set up an account with Vanco but after that you can access the donation page through either the WEB page or directly through Vanco (or GivePlus) for current and future donations.
- 4. Sign up for ACH (automated clearing house similar to electronic funds transfer) from your checking or savings account and have your offering deducted from your checking account each month or quarter and deposited in the church's account. Get a sign up form in the church office or call us or e-mail us and we'll e-mail you a form.

How we stay in touch in this time of separation

Missing in this month's Good News is the calendar - because as of Friday, March 13 (how appropriate) everything was canceled due to the COVID-19 crisis. We don't know for how long this will be in effect, but we'll let you know when we start scheduling meetings and events again. In the meantime, we'll keep you informed through various means »

- » Sunday bulletins and sermons on our web page. Go to www.FPCRochester.org. Below the top banner is 'Worship @ FPC' and below that click on 'Learn More'. That will bring up a choice of sermons (click one and click 'read more') and bulletins (click a date, read more, and download PDF).
- » Sunday worship. Since March 15 we have live-streamed an informal Sunday worship service with T.J., Jay, and John at 10 a.m. on YouTube and Facebook. Please note this is a 'closed service' and open only to the participants. Because of COVID-19 restrictions, other members of the congregation are not permitted to attend the actual service. In addition to Sundays, we considering live-streaming a Maundy Thursday (April 9) service at 7 p.m. and a Good Friday (April 10) service at noon.
- » How do I access the services? The easiest way is on our church's WEB page:
 - 1. Go to www.FPCRochester.org. Depending on how you access that, you may need to click on 'First Presbyterian Church located near Mayo Clinic.'
 - 2. There should be a red banner across the top of the screen. If there is, click on that. If there isn't, scroll down to 'Highlighted Events' and click on the left panel. The link to live stream is under the picture. Click on the link and you should be ready to watch. Until we actually go on the air, the space you get may be blank or something else, so don't panic!
- » <u>Good News in Brief</u>. If you aren't now on the GNB e-mailing list, call the church office or send an e-mail to evans.carol512@gmail.com. GNB is a weekly newsletter we e-mail each Wednesday or Thursday. This is an 'opt-in' newsletter you have to let us know you want to get it.
- » TextInChurch. If you're on this app, watch your cellphone/Smartphone for special announcements. To be contacted, text keyword "connect" to 507-200-3175.
- » Anything else we can tell you (other than when things will be back to normal)?

In these challenging times, supporting one another means more than ever. We'll communicate information as it becomes available. For now, please continue to take care of yourself and look out for one another.
