Committees request \$850,000 for 2020; available funds reach \$789,600

Thank you for your response to our pledge campaign for 2020. Your responses to both the original drive and the supplemental drive have been supportive and we appreciate it.

Including general and outreach budget pledges, the supplemental drive to date, and non-pledged income, as of December 19 we have \$789,600 committed for 2020. To fund committees' current budgets and allow for some growth we need about \$850,000, leaving a negative income gap of \$60,400.

We have asked you to participate in a supplemental pledge because we believe our members are pleased with our current staffing and church outreach and want to have it continue. If you haven't already responded, we hope you will consider helping erase the shortfall in pledges by completing a supplemental pledge or by making an extra contribution to the church. Supplemental pledge forms are available at the welcome desk and in the church office or indicate on your check it is for the shortfall.

More complete information will be available in the Annual Reports and in the February Good News.



January 2020

By the time you read this, it may already be 2020. But New Year's is always a good time to look back and take stock of the year that has been as well as to look forward to the year that will be. In the U.S., we mark the passing of a year with the ball dropping in Times Square, a

toast of champagne and a kiss with a loved one. Other countries have some pretty fascinating traditions of their own.

For instance, in Mexico and Italy, people wear red underwear to find love. But in Argentina, they opt for pink (Yes, that goes for men and women!) Or, you could opt for yellow and gold or green underwear for wealth and white for peace in the new year.

If you wish to travel more in the coming year, pack your suitcase and walk around the block this New Year's, as they do in Colombia and Ecuador. For people in Spain, the tradition of eating 12 grapes, making a wish for each one, represents every month. Eat them at the stroke of midnight, and fortune may smile on you! Many people in the Southern part of the U.S. believe that eating black-eyed peas or blackeyed pea stew as a New Year's dish can help bring financial prosperity in the New Year (that sounds pretty good, I might try that one!)

How to simplify your giving

Simplify your life with automatic contributions

- Operating Budget pledge
- * Outreach Budget pledge
- * Supplementary pledge

Since 1993 we have offered you access to an automatic pledge payment plan through Automated Clearing House (ACH), similar to the Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) many of you use to pay utility and other bills. This year 92 pledging units used ACH, either monthly or quarterly. Individual debits range from \$2-2,000 per month and \$25-1,300 per quarter. Some members pay all their pledge via ACH; others pay part of it. The average monthly amount collected through ACH is \$20,263, or about 35% of our monthly pledge income.

We are always happy to add new contributors to the process. We can debit accounts at all financial institutions. If ACH doesn't work out for you, you can cancel anytime by calling the church before the first Tuesday of the month and telling us to "stop."

To sign up, complete an Automatic Payment Authorization, available in the church office, telling the church how much to debit your account monthly or quarterly and return it to the church with a voided check.

January: Vital Vitamin D

Parish Nursing

In these short dark days of winter, we all feel like we're not getting enough sunshine. If you're not, you may need the sunshine vitamin— Vitamin D.

What does it do? Vitamin D helps your body absorb calcium to ensure strong, firm bones. Sufficient vitamin D may also be linked to lower rates of cancer, multiple sclerosis, depression, and cognitive decline.

How do you get it? Vitamin D is the sunshine vitamin. Our body can produce it by itself as long as we get enough sunlight on unprotected skin. Even sunscreen stops that process. We can also get it in fortified milk, cereal, and fatty fish like salmon.

Should I take a supplement? It depends.

You should especially consider it if you have darker skin (which makes it harder to produce Vitamin D), you have intestinal problems that may make it hard to absorb Vitamin D, you are overweight which can dilute your Vitamin D, or you're over 50, which means your body is less efficient at producing Vitamin D. Excessive Vitamin D has side effects too but generally this is one of the safest and best tolerated vitamins.

How much should I take?

Babies up to 12 months: 400 international units (IU) Ages 1-70: 600 IU

70+: 800 IU

Vitamin D does interact with several medications so discuss use with your doctor or care team pharmacist.

Per Capita assessed at \$36.50 per member for 2020

As local church members, we have an obligation to support our higher judicatories. This per capita assessment supports overhead expenses of our church, including presbytery, synod, and general assembly.

The amount due each judicatory is set at the particular unit's meeting during the summer and is based on membership on December 31 of the previous year. Our membership on December 31, 2018 was 671. The assessment per active member includes \$22.05 for presbytery, \$5.50 for synod, and \$8.95 for general assembly.

Even if you choose to not pledge, we urge you to consider making a donation of at least \$36.50 per member to help us underwrite this budget item of \$24,491.50. Thank you!

An update on the mission field from the Middle East to South America

The Middle East has many lessons to teach the church. In Iraq the church has remained the faithful remnant despite war, sanctions, and upheaval. In Lebanon the church moves forward amid protests, poverty, and instability. In Syria the church is rebuilding after invasion, strife, and migration. In each of these countries the church has served as a model of resiliency and faithfulness.

Turkey/Syria conflicts take toll on population

After the U.S. troops withdrew and Turkey invaded northern Syria, three of the eighteen Presbyterian churches have been caught in the conflict. The churches and their families are now heading into a financial crisis, as well as a humanitarian one. The price of meat has risen to \$10/kilo (an average salary is \$80/month). Heating fuel is becoming scarce and expensive as cold weather sets in. The city water service in Hasakeh has stopped after the source spring was bombed, requiring the purchase of bottled water. 300,000 Syrians have been displaced from surrounding villages and will need to be cared for in the cities. Some of your mission funds have been sent to the Emergency Appeal for Northeast Syria.

Venezuela suffers economic crisis

According to the United Nations, more than four million Venezuelans have left their country. Those that remain in Venezuela are struggling. Despite the severe economic crisis, the Presbyterian Church of Venezuela has been demonstrating grace in many ways. Thanks to donations, thousands of food baskets have been distributed and medications have been provided to members and friends who could not afford them. Your mission funds have also supported the Venezuela Appeal.

The Egyptian Presbyterian Church is growing and is becoming a model for new church development and revitalization.

Would you like to see the church in action firsthand? The Outreach Foundation is taking trips to Lebanon/Syria May 18-28 and Egypt March 5-16. There are also trips to Haiti (May 30-June 6), Guatemala (March 14-22) and Cuba (October 3-10). For more information, contact info@theoutreachfoundation.org

Instruments of praise

Some innovative musicians play instruments that actually melt at their fingertips. Their ice creations — everything from drums and a pipe organ to harps and didgeridoos — make awe-inspiring sounds (search online to hear for yourself).

The unique challenges posed by dissolving instruments seem to increase their impact. "ICEstruments" sculptor Tim Linhart says concertgoers, whose bodies also are largely composed of water, often feel a "spiritual connection" to the music.

Although people don't melt, our physical bodies eventually return to ashes and dust. Despite that impermanence, God created us as wonderful instruments to make joyful noises for him: "Let everything that has breath praise the LORD!" (Psalm 150:6).

Building and Grounds


The good news is that our building is a solid and well-built structure.
