July 23, 2017 - 1 p.m. - Cascade Meadow Wetlands

The group walk for July will take place July 23 at Cascade Meadow Wetlands. Meet at Cascade Meadow (2900 19th Street NW) at 1 p.m. Cascade Meadow sits on a 100-acre site of which 90 acres of natural areas have been restored. A system of approximately 2 miles of trails winds its way through seven different types of wetlands and three upland communities. Renewable energy systems on site include electric generation with wind and solar, as well as solar thermal hot water and geothermal heat pump for heating and cooling. Remember to bring a hat and water and wear sunscreen. Please feel free to invite a friend.

August 27, 2017 - 1 p.m. - Willow Creek Reservoir

Meet at the Willow Creek Reservoir in SW Rochester at 1 p.m. The parking lot is at the end of Lone Pine Drive SW. We will hike the trail that goes around the reservoir. We might even get to see the eagles that have a nest in the area.

September 24, 2017 - 1 p.m. - Root River Park

Meet at Root River Park (4012 80th Street SE) at 1 p.m. The Root River Park is a relatively new park and is another of Olmsted County's best kept secrets. When we get to the park we'll check out the old stagecoach bridge and the 90-foot tall limestone bluffs. The trail is about 2 miles long and is a nice wide grass covered trail. The scenery is beautiful. You might want to bring a camera.



For those of you who have ever served as an elder or a deacon, you've probably heard the term "connectional church." This is an idea very much central to who we are as Presbyterians. We believe that we as a congregation do not stand

alone. We serve God and Jesus Christ together with the other PCUSA congregations in our Presbytery and beyond. Most of the time we experience this connectionalism when we go through periods of transition (such as searching for a new pastor), conflict (such as a congregational dispute or wishing to leave the denomination, etc...), or even growth (such as when one of our members is interested in pursuing the ministry, or if we want to take out a mortgage).

But our connectionalism is actually on display every time we meet as a Presbytery and whenever one of the committees of the Presbytery meet to do their work. At the current time, there are many opportunities to experience connectionalism in our Presbytery. Many of the committees of the Presbytery are in need of people to help do the work of the church.

The greatest needs are with the Committee on Ministry, the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, the Nominating Committee and the Committee on Ethics. Please consider whether God might be calling you to serve the PCUSA on a larger stage.

I encourage you to visit the re-designed Presbytery website – just search Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area. Committee descriptions, with meeting times and places, can be found there under "For PTCA members only." Current Committee membership and vacancies can be found in the "Directory" section. This summer they are in the United States and we will be privileged to meet them and hear more about their work on August 1. We anticipate this will be an evening meeting and will have more details on the time when we know when they will arrive in Rochester.

The Rev. David Cortes-Fuentes and Josey Saez Acevedo are in their second year of a four-year mission co-worker appointment, serving alongside the 15,000 member Presbyterian Reformed Church of Cuba. They are the first Presbyterian mission co-workers sent from the United States to live and work in Cuba since the 1959 revolution led by Fidel Castro.

David is professor of New Testament and Greek at the Evangelical Seminary of Theology in Matanzas, Cuba. Josey assists the Cuban church's Christian education ministries. They both lead devotions in the seminary chapel and speak as invited by Cuban Presbyterian churches and groups visiting the seminary.

As natives of Puerto Rico, David and Josey share ethnic and cultural affinities with the people of Cuba. They developed an appreciation for the country through Cuban friends and mentors in the years prior to their mission appointment. David and Josey sense a call to be a part of a new sense of hope that's emerging in the Cuban church and society.

Don't get 'ticked' off this summer

One of the best parts of summer in Minnesota is being outside - hiking, gardening, and playing on the lake.

However one of the worst parts of summer is also lurking in nature... ticks! Ticks carry unpleasant illnesses like Lyme Disease, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, and several other unpleasant diseases.

- ★ Prevent tick bites and illnesses by wearing long pants and sleeves in thick woods, applying an insect repellent with DEET, and removing brush where ticks like to hide. Check yourself and your kids and animals after being in a tick zone, watching out for warm and hairy areas. Remove ticks promptly by grabbing them close to the skin with a tweezers and pulling them out gently (try to keep them intact).
- ★ After a tick exposure, watch for symptoms such as a bulls eye rash at a tick bite, rash on palms and soles, joint aches and pains, headaches, or unusual fever.
- ★ Tell your provider if you have symptoms or concerns. Lyme Disease is a relatively common illness and has a safe and effective antibiotic treatment. Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is more rare and serious so if you have fever, headache, or a rash on palms and soles, get it checked out quickly.

Though we often hear only the dark and disturbing stories coming out of the Middle East, on February 26 there was an historic moment of celebration. The Presbyterian Church in Tripoli and the National Evangelical (Presbyterian) Synod of Syria and Lebanon ordained the

Rev. Rola Sleiman as the first Arab woman to serve as a Minister of Word and Sacrament.

South Sudan on verge famine

More than 1.5 million citizens of South Sudan have fled the country since the civil war began and more than 1.8 million people have been displaced internally. Most recently the United Nations has deemed South Sudan as a famine state, as millions are in danger of starvation. Some argue that South Sudan's violence constitutes genocide. Yei, where Shelvis and Nancy Smith-Mather were working, has been the epicenter of violence for months. Consequently Shelvis, Nancy, and their three children are now living in Arua, Uganda, where they continue helping RECONCILE's ministries of peace building and trauma healing reach the South Sudanese now living in refugee camps such as Rhino Refugee Camp and Bidi Bidi Camp, now considered the largest refugee camp in the world.

Many citizens remain in South Sudan's capital, Juba, where the church continues to focus on education. Since the schools often do not have access to water, students come for only a few hours in the morning. They either bring their own plastic chairs from home or stand in the back of the class. The South Sudan Education and Peacemaking Project (SSEPP) remains committed to the students. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is working on this problem.

PW Circles support national Birthday Offering

PW recently gave \$1300 given by circle members and pledge money to support three projects of the 2017 Birthday Offering:

- Navajo Water Project, New Mexico. This grant will provide a running water system for forty families that do not have access to running water in their homes.
- The Family Justice Center, South Carolina. This grant will assist Family Justice Center in achieving its goal of constructing a new domestic violence shelter for victims of abuse living in Georgetown and Horry Counties in northeastern South Carolina.
- First Hand Aid, Cuba. The Rural Clinic Development Initiative is designed to establish six medical clinics in partnership with, and located at, Presbyterian churches in rural Cuba that will provide medicine and care not available, or difficult to get, from Cuban sources in these communities.

Presbyterian Women support local, national, and international projects

- ► \$400 for LINK (Living Independently with Knowledge), which serves homeless teens
- ▶ \$400 for Channel One for their summer food program
- \$400 for Civic League Day Nursery to provide financial aid for those who can't afford daycare
- \$400 for Mission 21, which provides resources and restoration services to victims of human trafficking under the age of 16



- ➤ \$1000 to Presbyterian Disaster

- ➤ \$500 for **Su Casa de Esperanza**, a Presbyterian border ministry whose

mission is to improve the quality of life of children through a faith-based family education program



- \$500 to NOROC, which facilitates the spiritual, social, physical, and emotional development of Romanian orobans
- \$450 to Haiti Education Foundation to provide for the education of six students
- \$450 to IMA World Health to support the IMA Medicine Box and Safe Motherhood kits, which provide essential medicines and supplies to clinics and people who need them
- \$684 through Presbyterian Mission Agency to provide six families of chickens and three pairs of goats to families who need them


