Forums@First presents program on "Menneskebiblioteket"

For anyone and everyone that correctly pronounces and defines this 19-letter word, a free donut will be available at the next Sunday morning service. And for those who might not know the pronunciation and definition of the Danish word, it means "Human Library." And for those who don't fully understand "Human Library," please read on.

"Human Library" was developed in Copenhagen in the spring of 2000 as a project for Roskilde Festival (Northern Europe's largest summer festival) by two brothers and some colleagues. The youngsters initiated the project after a mutual friend was stabbed in 1993. To raise awareness and use peer group education to mobilize Danish youngsters against violence, the group was first called 'Stop the Violence.'

In a few years the organization had 30,000 members. Soon it progressed to something much greater. Policemen were soon visiting with graffiti writers; politicians were visiting with youth activists; a football fan was visiting with a feminist. It was a win-win situation and has been ever since. Today it has been presented in more than 70 countries.

On May 30 (6:30 p.m.), the spring "Forums@First" will feature a Human Library Lite at F.P.C. It will give everyone from the community an opportunity to see what a Human Library is like, how it functions, and the chance to meet some "Human Books." The "Human Books" could be a bipolar person; an ADHD individual; or someone who is deaf/blind; a PTSD soldier; a homeless person; someone who may have been molested; a Muslim; an addict; someone with HIV; someone unemployed; someone who is autistic; a brain-damaged person; a young single parent; etc. The May 30 Forum will have a few "books" available for everyone to interact with after a brief presentation on what a Human Library is.

If you enjoy reading about others and want to learn more about others, this will give you a great opportunity to have a meaningful interaction with someone(s) that is eager to share their lives with you. We hope to see you there:



May 2017

I came across an article recently in the April/May issue of Presbyterians Today. It appears near the back page and is written by Vernon Broyles III, a volunteer for public witness in the PC(USA)'s Office of the General Assembly. He asks some important questions and

raises some good points. I'd like to share it with you...

Faith vs. fear Biblical mandate trumps worries about 'outsiders'

When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God. – Leviticus 19:33-34.

Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. – Hebrews 13:2

Recent events compel me to ask some important questions. The message the Bible gives us about how to treat strangers is the same over and over again. How many times must we hear it? How many times will we stop up our ears? How many times will we recoil in fear at those who are different?

How many times will we confirm the cynicism of the atheist by declaring loudly that we love Jesus and worship the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, but then turn away the children of Abraham and Hagar? How often can we say we believe in the God our Scripture claims is the father of us all, and turn away "outsiders" as if they are not God's children too? How can we who claim to love Jesus heed the voices of those among us whose rhetoric consigns people of other faiths to eternal damnation or rejects them as unworthy to be our fellow citizens?

In the face of these realities, how shall we, in response to God's clear mandate to show hospitality to the stranger, resist the fearful, racist, ungodly attacks that are being visited on so many who come seeking shelter on our shores?

The apostle Paul is very clear that as Christians, we are to be obedient to the civil authorities. He writes in Romans that the authorities are God's servants for our good. Our Presbyterian heritage calls us to that obedience; but it also calls us to faithful resistance when the authorities no longer respect the image of God in people.

Each of us has to determine God's will for our lives, including discerning when to be obedient to the civil authorities and when to resist, knowing that resistance ordinarily carries a penalty. Still, it is one thing to resist or submit when we are the ones at risk and another when we see some of God's children being slandered or abused.

In the mid-1930's the German Protestant churches struggled with how to respond to growing authoritarianism. Some conformed and remained silent; others resisted. One of the most poignant testimonies is from pastor Martin Niemoller of the German Confessing Church:

- "First they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out – because I was not a Socialist.
- Then they came for the Trade Unionists, and I did not speak out – because I was not a Trade Unionist.
- Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out

 because I was not a Jew.
- Then they came for me and there was no one left to speak for me."

Christ is risen! He has risen indeed! He awaits our response.

Something worth thinking about.

Willing recipients

A young graduate longed for a certain sports car and knew his dad could afford it. So on the big day, he was infuriated to receive instead a leather-bound, embossed Bible. He threw it down and left for good.

Years later, after his father died, the son entered his father's study with sorrow and regret. Sorting through belongings, he found the gift and this highlighted verse: "If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!" (Matthew 7:11, ESV). Suddenly something dropped from the back of the Bible: a key with a tag from the dealer of the car he'd wanted long ago. 

May: Sunproof your Skin

May is skin cancer awareness and prevention month. As the sun emerges and we begin to spend time outside, it's important

to remember to protect our skin and

watch out for skin changes that could be concerning. When looking at your skin, watch out for the ABCDEs of skin cancer - Asymmetric, Borders that are rough or irregular, Color that is unusual or varies, Diameter bigger than

a pencil eraser, or an Evolving, growing mole.

If you notice these signs in a spot, get an appointment to have your provider examine it!

To prevent skin cancer, here are a few tips:

- Avoid tanning and tanning beds! Tanning may cause more cancer than smoking!
- Wear sunscreen when you're outside, and reapply frequently. Even people blessed with a dark complexion need sunscreen.
- 3) Wear sun-protective clothing, hats, and sunglasses.
- 4) Seek shade, especially during the peak of the sun's UV activity between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- 5) If you do notice a spot you're concerned about, you may need a punch or shave biopsy to tell what's going on. Catching skin cancer early can prevent a lot of trouble down the road. Enjoy the nice weather, but don't forget to protect your skin!


