Director of Music Search Committee reports on progress

Hello People of the Church:

The search for our next Director of Music continues to progress and we are moving closer to finding the right person for the position. The committee recently met with promising candidates, learning more about them and giving them an opportunity to learn more about our church and the community.

The interviewing process and suggestions from outside consultants led us to examine our position and similar church music compensation packets. We have become much more aware of the adjustments we will need to consider, as the interviews move to the stage where we can consider making employment offers. Participating in the process makes one much more aware of the cost of necessities like health care, continuing education, and annual salary.

The function and importance of music in the life of the church and the quality of musicianship we are seeking will require us to make competitive employment offers. The search committee is now compiling and reviewing information from various sources to help us as we approach the financial stage of hiring a new Director.

Our interviews with candidates has been an extremely helpful step in solidifying what the committee believes works for our congregation. We continue to talk with references about the candidates, as part of the final steps, before making employment offers. Currently, I believe the committee is on track to complete our search process by the end of June with the candidate arriving in late July or August.

The search committee requests your continued prayers as we proceed with the search process. You would be extremely proud of the way the committee members have worked as a team to effectively manage the search.

Parents are also welcome to keep their children with them in worship for the entire hour. Coffee and donuts will be available at 9 a.m. before the service and again after the service.



You are invited to Celebration Sunday May 19 at 9:45 a.m.



Mission Team returns to Spirit Lake Indian Reservation

In June the FPC Bdecan Vacation Bible School team will return to North Dakota to provide VBS for the fifth time.

Last year our congregation was very generous in providing funds for winter clothing for the children of the Bdecan church. It is wonderful you did that because it was bitterly cold in northern North Dakota this winter, even colder than it was here. The warm winter clothing was much appreciated! Members also gathered and sent a wonderful amount of school supplies for the children.

This year, PW members sewed fleece book bags for the kids to use during VBS (and hopefully in the fall when school starts) and collected much needed hygiene items for the children from the reservation heading off to another year of residential school. Thank you!

In May we will be gathering school supplies and again asking for assistance with funding to purchase winter clothing for the Bdecan children as needed. Purchasing the clothing is supervised by Joe Obermeyer, the youth pastor, who has now become a Commissioned Lay Pastor after completing a two-year program.

Healing hospitality

Repeated headlines about violence can make us "feel like locking our doors and never entering society again," writes pastor and author Max Lucado. After another mass shooting, he penned an online opinion piece that urged people to do the exact opposite by opening their doors, their hearts and their circles.

"It's no accident that hospitality and hospital come from the same Latin word," Lucado writes, "for they both lead to the same result: healing. When you open your door to someone, you are sending this message: 'You matter.'"

Because daily life is filled with rejections, extending an invitation — even to a simple meal — can be life-altering, Lucado contends. What you think is a messy house might be a sanctuary to someone else, "and to those who eat alone every night, pork and beans on paper plates tastes like filet mignon." Our kitchen tables are "God's secret weapons in the war on fear," Lucado says. "We never know what one meal will do."


New library books offer support for those grieving or facing hardships

Grief Support Group open to everyone

If you are grieving the recent death of your spouse or a relative or other loved one, please consider attending our grief support group. The group meets the first Tuesday of each month at 11a.m. in the church library (adjacent to the church office).

This is an informal group that offers fellowship with others who are experiencing grief first-hand, and an opportunity (and a place) to share the burden of your grief with them and God.

To be clear, I'm not a licensed group- or grief-therapist; my role is more convener and co-participant. As a participant you decide whether this might be helpful for you or not. The group invites any who are grieving to come and find out.

Support offered for those affected by transitions

In February I attended a workshop about providing spiritual support for people experiencing the common but significant experience of moving out of your long-time home (or apartment) into a retirement community or assisted living apartment/facility (and/or moving into a smaller apartment or even a single room in the same building).

The class introduced us to prayers for this experience: thanksgiving for the precious memories, gatherings and people who lived there; prayers for the people moving in to become the next stewards with their own memories and lives to add to the story of the living space; prayers of blessing that the new living space may become a special place with a secure future, a place promising friendship, fellowship, and more treasured memories.

I welcome the opportunity to come visit with you before, during or after such a transition, to pray with you, but moreover to represent the great cloud of witnesses that is your faith and your faith community, to take action to convey to you that you are not forgotten, this situation is not something out-of-sight, out-of-mind in the life of your church; that this is also a new beginning for you, a new opportunity, with new people, a new life and a continuation of your life in community and in faith.

Go Ride A Bike!

May is Bike Awareness Month and a great time to pull that bike out of the garage. Just make sure

you follow these tips to have a safe, fun bike season!



- Always wear your helmet! Make sure it fits snugly and that kids have the right size.
- 2) Be visible! Wear bright clothes, and try to ride during the day. And "If you ride at night, use a light!"
- Ride defensively. In groups, ride in single file in the direction of traffic. Watch out for cars, car doors, and other hazards.
- 4) **Be loud!** Use a horn or bell or your voice to make sure that drivers are aware of your intentions.
- 5) **Be present.** Avoid headphones and mobile phone usage, which can distract you from what's happening around you.



Registration opens for Synod Gathering of Presbyterian Women June 20–23

Registration has begun for the Synod Gathering of Presbyterian Women June 20-23 in Ames, Iowa. The theme for the Gathering is from John 7:38: "Out of the believer's heart shall flow streams of living water." Synod of Lakes and Prairies includes MN, IA, WI, NE, ND and SD. The meetings will be held at the Gateway Hotel and Conference Center in Ames.

The registration fee of \$200 includes meals and all programming. Room is in addition; information about the availability and cost is in the registration booklet.
