A Festival of Music series opens with organist Adam Brakel

Concert organist Adam Brakel will open the twenty-sixth season of First Presbyterian Church's *A Festival of Music* Concert Series on Sunday, October 16.

Brakel's spell-binding performances have led to his being compared to Liszt, Gould, Bernstein and Paganini and prove

that true musical prodigies continue to exist in the 21st century. He has also been recognized by some as "one of the most talented organists in the world."

After beginning his musical studies at the age of four, he furthered his training at Duquesne University where he studied organ with John Walker and David Craighead and at The Juilliard School in New York City. He recently received his Graduate Performance Diploma from the Peabody Conservatory where he studied with Donald Sutherland and visiting guest professor Dame Gillian Weir.

His recent performance highlights include performances of the complete works of César Franck and more notably, the difficult Six Etudes of Jeanne Demessieux. Brakel is one of very few performers to handle these virtuoso works. He has distinguished himself by winning top prizes in international organ competitions, making an intentional study of jazz music for the pipe organ, and working with leading jazz composers in the development of new works in this genre.

In addition to his concert career, both in the United States

and abroad, Brakel serves as Director of Music at St. Frances Xavier Cabrini Parish in the Diocese of St. Petersburg, Florida.

The concert will begin at 4 p.m in the sanctuary. There is no admission fee but a freewill offering will be taken. A dessert reception will follow the concert. Adam Brakel in concert First Presbyterian Church Sunday, October 16, 2016



Celebrate World Communion Sunday with Christians around the world October 2

Come to the Lord's Table

"For anyone who eats and drinks without recognizing the body of the Lord eats and drinks judgment on himself."

(I Corinthians II:29 [NIV])

The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us that we are to "discern the body" when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. It is appropriate that World Communion Sunday is also a time when we receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need.

Worldwide Communion Sunday originated in the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh in 1933, was adopted throughout the U.S. Presbyterian Church in 1936, and subsequently spread to other denominations. In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches (now the National Council of Churches) endorsed World Communion Sunday and began to promote it to Christian churches worldwide.

Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.



Luther used art and the newly invented printing press to challenge Europe's leaders and spread a revolution of religious, cultural, and societal change. This exhibition includes paintings, sculpture, gold textiles, and works on paper — as well as Luther's personal possessions and recent archeological finds — that shed new light on an explosive era and the man who ignited it."

The exhibit is running at the MiA from October 30, 2016-January 15, 2017. I plan to go see it some Saturday in those months and I am wondering if anyone would like to join me. I know I am available Nov. 5, Nov. 26 (Thanksgiving weekend), Dec. 17, and Jan. 14. Healthy Teeth for a Healthy Life

check up. Did you know that dental health can affect your heart? That's right - the inflammation from gum disease may increase the risk of heart disease. In addition, dental professionals are best suited to catching oral cancers early. So not

Columbarium: place of the dove

From early Christian times churches have maintained an area of the church for interring the remains of its members and loved ones.

The area was often referred to as a columbarium, the Latin word for a dove-cote: the dwelling place of a columba, a dove

With a return to the ancient custom of cremation, it is again possible to use a columbarium as a place of interment, allowing for the ashes of the faithful to be deposited within the church property, as was common in times past.

The First Presbyterian Church Columbarium was dedicated in May 1991 in memory of Jacqueline Beth Goodyear. One hundred six of the 192 niches have been reserved.

In 2014, the 221st General Assembly approved a change from the Peacemaking Offering to the Peace & Global Witness Offering. This transition will extend the depth of the Offering and inspire more Presbyterians to join this mission. This new Offering will allow us to broaden our reach, making a greater impact and bringing peace to people through Christ.

Gifts to this Offering provide opportunities for:

Peace building: While violence and oppression know no age, gender, or race, women and children are most often the victims of these atrocities. The Offering will focus on these by providing prevention, accompaniment, and eradication.

Global issues: Lack of education across the globe has become one of the most serious issues facing our population. A significant mission of the Offering will be addressing illiteracy and poverty through outreach and community development.

Witness: Through witness to the love and peace of Christ, the Offering will train leaders to become peace builders in communities through bringing together regions in conflict, helping communities heal, and teaching important reconciliation tactics.

Seventy-five percent of the funds we receive go directly to support these activities; twenty-five percent is retained locally to support programs that build peace in our community.


