The Lenten season has traditionally been a time when Christians attend to the cultivation of the things of the spirit.



First Presbyterian Church celebrates 155th anniversary, recognizes 50⁺-year members



The First Presbyterian Church of Rochester was founded on February 17, 1861, by Sheldon Jackson. Since then we have traveled the roads of 155 years. Some of these roads have been rough, some smooth, some straight, some winding, but each one has helped reveal to us the love of God working through our lives.

On February 21 we will honor and say "thank you" to 77 "golden" people who have been members for at least 50 years. Their names have been in our bulletins and newsletters as Sunday School teachers, ushers, choir members, stewardship campaign workers, elders, and deacons. Many of them still appear on the church's doorstep regularly as volunteers.

Our most senior member, Ursula Thedens, was confirmed at First Presbyterian in 1942. Our oldest "golden," Margaret Harris, joined in 1951. Our youngest "golden," Judy Kruesel, was confirmed in 1965.

Session adopts \$794,200 budget

At its January meeting Session adopted a budget of \$794,200 for 2016. This is a 1.1% (\$9,400) decrease over the 2015 budget.

The budget will be underwritten by general budget pledges (\$612,499), outreach pledges (\$92,277), one-time gift (\$15,000), contributions over pledge (\$45,000), plate offering (\$13,500), miscellaneous income, rent and interest (\$12,324), and a Faith Factor (\$3,600).

Committees were diligent in watching their budgets, and we ended 2015 with a balance of \$44,045 that will be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for extraordinary expenses or to cover years when we have a deficit.


